Pastoral Reflection

The Ministry of Reconciliation

Dear Friends,

*“If anyone is in Christ, there is a new creation;
everything old has passed away; see everything has become new!
All this is from God, who has reconciled us to Himself through Christ,
and has given us the ministry of reconciliation.” II Corinthians 5:17-18*

During the past month our nation has witnessed irrational violence and unspeakable grief in the aftermath of shootings in Florida, Louisiana, Minnesota and Texas. People have taken to the streets and to the internet to share and vent their feelings, fears and frustrations. Great debates and discussions have been held and should continue to be held in conferences and over kitchen tables, all seeking a solution to the crisis that confronts us as a nation, a community, and as individuals. I do not propose an answer here because, unfortunately, I do not have one; however, I am convinced of this: as people of God called to peace, justice and reconciliation we must agree that this behavior, borne of hatred and racism and bigotry and prejudice and fear-mongering, must stop. To that end, I believe the Church has a unique and God-given role to play. We are called both to prayer and to action. This passage from Paul's second letter to the Corinthians gives us both the **theory** (theology) and the **praxis** (the practical application) to the problem that confronts us.

Theory/Theology:

Anyone who is in Christ Jesus is a new creation - which means we are called to live among and relate to one another in a new way. *Everything old has passed away; see everything has become new!* The “old way” of relating to others is based on differences in race, ethnicity, socio-economic status, and the like, fueled by hatred, fear and mistrust of “the other.” The “new way” of relating to others is based on love, acceptance and compassion. We are called to be “new way” of living people because *“God has reconciled us to Himself in Jesus Christ.”* If we understand what God has done for us in Jesus Christ (loved us, forgiven us, saved us, redeemed and restored us) then we can no longer live and relate to others in the “old way.”

Praxis/Practical application:

Since God has reconciled us to Himself in Jesus Christ *“we have been given a ministry of reconciliation.”* We are called to replicate in our relationships with others what God has done for us in Jesus Christ, not just in thought but in action. Friends, given the crisis of hatred and violence which is rampant in our nation and our community, we cannot wait for someone else to “do something about it.” We must take action ourselves in very particular ways, person to person, neighbor to neighbor, friend to friend. To us has been given the ministry of reconciliation. If you cannot name a person who you can call “friend” who does not look, act, think or believe as you do, then I suggest you begin this process of reconciliation with a prayer of confession and repentance for the part you/we have played in creating “walls of division.” Then take the first step toward building a bond or bridge of friendship, perhaps starting with a simple conversation, an invitation to coffee or a meal. There are complex and critical issues which confront us as a society, and I am fully aware that even among those who call themselves followers of Jesus Christ there will be great debate and disagreement as to the best way to solve them. “Persons of good character and principle may differ.” However, we surely must be able to agree that there is a better, safer, more just and peaceful way for us to live together, so we must commit our every power of purpose and persuasion to that end. Simply put, if we are not fully engaged in this ministry of reconciliation with others, then perhaps we have not yet understood the work of reconciliation Christ has done for us.

“Let us be doers of the Word and not hearers only.”

Youth Colombia Trip 2016

I knew something was up when Pastor Oscar and Brodie Sears (former Youth Director) came to my office in late 2015 with big smiles on their faces. The first question they asked was “How would you like to go to Colombia?” And that friendly visit began a trip of inspiration, illness, amazement, exhaustion, laughter, and new friendships.

After a few unexpected “hiccups,” eleven youth and four adults representing Tab arrived in Medellin, Colombia the evening of June 18. Since Colombia is on Central Time, there was not much jet lag, but there was just plain exhaustion from beginning our journey in Indianapolis at 4:30a and finally seeing our temporary home in Medellin about 9:00p. Our second (Sunday) evening ended with devotionals focused on the example of Jesus Christ from Philippians 2:3-11 with the following statement and question: “Jesus went to the extreme to save us. Part of the mission trip experience is getting out of our comfort zone. What is one thing on the mission trip that will push you out of your comfort zone?” Our responses ranged from food, language, cultural differences, hills that were steeper than San Francisco, heat, and a high altitude. So, we all had adjustments we had to make remembering what Christ had endured for each of us made those adjustments much easier.

On our first day of work, we were given our projects, moving rocks and stones for a sidewalk, digging out a trench where pavers would be placed, and pulling, by hand, weeds like none I’ve ever seen. Our eyes were big with wonderment at what we were being asked to do, but each of us went to work. By the end of the week, we were all proud of our accomplishments and what we had learned. Our workdays were interrupted with trips to soccer fields in one of the 22 sectors of the city that are operated by the Christian Union Sports Club (CUSC) that our missionary, Mark Wittig, manages.

With each visit to the various soccer fields, we were astonished and happy to meet youth ranging in age from 4-20. Their lives centered around Jesus and soccer, in that order. They prayed with us and then were very proud to show off their soccer skills. Personally, I was relieved that the eleven youth on the trip were such avid soccer athletes; it saved me from embarrassing myself. (I was a permanent audience member.)

We visited two churches, whose ministers are coaches with the CUSC, which demonstrated for us the wide reach Mark has in Medellin. Services were longer than Tab’s, but the one thing we could say without exception was that those in attendance were true believers in Jesus Christ, which made us feel right at home.

As we talked on our way back to the US, the comments from each participant reflected our collective inspiration at the commitment and accomplishments of our Tab supported mission; illness and minor injuries by several of us that we all survived; amazement at what we could accomplish working together as a team; exhaustion from doing manual labor in an unforgiving heat; laughter at ourselves and each other as we experienced new joys in life; and finally, new friendships within our group and with people we met in Medellin.

We just want to say, “thank you, Tab,” for supporting our mission trip and, “thank you, God,” for watching over us during our journey and throughout our lives.

Vigil for Peace



Our city will respond to these tragedies in our nation, but before we respond, my faith tells me that prayer works, and we need to ground our work ahead in prayer,” said Dr. David Hampton, pastor of Light of the World Christian Church and Deputy Mayor, as he opened the Mayor’s Prayer Vigil for Peace on July 9. The prayer vigil was held, “after a week of outrage and sadness at the shootings of Alton Sterling and Philando Castile, who were fatally shot by a police officer near St. Paul, Minnesota, on Wednesday, as well as five Dallas police officers who were killed Thursday by a sniper, residents of Indianapolis came together to pray, console each other, and seek solutions to the violence” (IndyStar).

I was one of seven clergy from different Christian denominations and faith traditions to pray at the vigil which denounced hatred and violence in our nation. While many people wondered what impact, if any, prayer would have; we were reassured that prayer is what transforms our hearts to be a part of the solution rather than passive participants. I have reflected on that prayer vigil since because a truth of the gospel was imparted into my heart, “many times we are the answer to our own prayers, we are the ones whom God has to work on to open our hearts toward action.” I can’t offer any solutions to the discord and lack of civility we are experiencing in our nation, but I am convinced that if the only voice we hear is political than we need to keep our ears open to the Gospel imperatives of forgiveness, reconciliation, and repentance.

After all, Jesus believed that it was not by straw-man argumentation or finding fault in the other that solved conflicts, but rather restoring relationships through the arduous work of reconciliation and loving your enemies as the vehicle for healing.

If there is one message of hope for this day it is that we believe a lack of relationship is what divides us. If the church can be a witness in these times, it is that it values relationship over slogans and that it values transformative justice that changes the heart and soul.
