# Pastoral Reflection

## The Greatest Gift

Dear Friends,

Tab has been given a wonderful gift; our building, furnishings and grounds.

Our benefactors are all of the faithful and generous men and women of Tab who since 1921 and then subsequently through the years, have given of their time, talents and treasures to make this magnificent facility possible. We are deeply in their debt.

Now it is our responsibility to take good care of the gift we have been given.

Every year we designate nearly \$400,000 from our operating budget for our ongoing use and maintenance of the building; including utilities, cleaning and repairs. Invariably in a building that is nearly 100 years old, things wear out and break, and of course those repairs are often quite expensive, but the Session plans carefully for those needs and our Facilities Committee does an outstanding job of managing both our facilities and the budget.

You will notice now that there is scaffolding up on the northwest corner of the building. We are repairing and replacing windows in the Parlor, Walker Nursery and along the West side of the building. All of these windows were constructed in such a way that they have to be repaired by an expert in old buildings. This is one of those projects that we take on when funds are available. This portion of windows is being financed by a generous gift from a Tab church member along with funds from the Facilities Committee.

Perhaps you have also heard the news that very soon we will be replacing the parking lot. As many of you have commented, this project is long over-due. There are already several coats of asphalt on the lot, so this time we will have to go down to the base and completely repave. This will be an expensive (\$500,000+) and time-consuming project, but one that is absolutely necessary. We will keep you informed as to timing and accessibility to the building during the construction.

And of course you are now aware that the stadium project is completed. While there is still a shortfall in funding, young people are playing football; parents and friends are sitting in the stands; the concession stand is open; and we are finally able to provide our guests with adequate restroom facilities.

Whenever we have major expenses such as these, the question is invariably raised, "Why should we invest so much in a building? Aren't there other needs that are more important?" These are good questions which should be openly considered and discussed.

As I consider these expenditures, I think of them as being investments in the ministry God has given us to do in the Mapleton-Fall Creek neighborhood. Just as we have been given the gift of a facility by our ancestors, so we have been given the gift of a mission and ministry by our Lord. We can't do the ministry we have been called by God to do anywhere except at the corner of 34<sup>th</sup> and Central. Our building, furnishings and grounds are all part of our ministry.

So, we need to take care of the gift we have been given because it enables us to share the GREATEST GIFT we have been given by God - the Gospel of Jesus Christ.

Thank you for your partnership and support of our mission and ministry.

# Spotlight

## Meet Dorothy Benz-Buchanan

At under five feet tall, Dorothy Benz-Buchanan may be small in stature, but she has been belting out high notes in the choir for the past 24 years. Majoring in voice at Butler University, Dorothy was a sophomore when she auditioned to be a soprano section leader at Tab. Matt Kaufman, Tab's Music Director, had her sight-read a Camille Saint-Saëns piece in French. "I told him I should get the part because it was my birthday," she chuckled.

Dorothy grew up as the youngest of six children. She was born in Vietnam and at four pounds, four ounces, was headed to the USA on one of the last planes to leave the country before the fall of Saigon. The only child without adoptive parents, she boarded as a last minute "extra." Little did anyone know that one of the children would pass away during the flight. She was adopted by the Benz family who lost that child and already had three older children. Her parents later adopted two more children, but she remains the youngest of them all.



Dorothy grew up in the Episcopal church, but she "really came to know God" when she was in college. She was an accomplished violinist with the Carmel High School Orchestra, having played since she was seven years old. The concert mistress of the orchestra, her decision to be a voice major was finalized just before starting college. She graduated from Butler in 1997.

Dorothy met her husband, Robert, in 1992. They met on the internet through a "poetry interest room" before it became popular to meet people on social media. Robert moved to Indiana from Virginia and they married in June 1999. They have one daughter, Becca, who is twelve, and as Dorothy put it, "a full tweenager."

After college, Dorothy continued as the soprano section leader at Tab. During this time, she used her music training to teach Kindermusik. "I love children," she remarked, remembering how many connections she made during those years of teaching. These connections have helped her launch her current entrepreneurial endeavors.

Today, Dorothy wears many hats. She's a freelance photographer, a fitness coach, and since July 2017, is a cabi stylist. "Cabi is a clothing company that creates alternative boutiques in women's homes and changes the way women shop and work," she explained.

As a fitness coach she has 30 clients. "My purpose is to share about my life and hopefully it will inspire others," she said. She works out at the Title Boxing Club regularly, but she still considers her role as a mom to be her greatest calling.

So the next time you see Dorothy singing in the choir loft hitting high notes that most of us can only dream of singing, tell her "thanks" and remember she is a faithful servant at Tab and a beautiful part of our church family.



# Where Were You On April 4, 1968?

Fifty years ago, April was a dark day in the history of America. Just five years earlier, the country had mourned the assassination of President John F. Kennedy. No one ever expected that another death of a national leader would happen soon. But, America was wrong - another assassination troubled the heart and soul of America with the murder of Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.

On April 4, approximately 200 people gathered in the Sanctuary of Tabernacle Presbyterian Church to participate in a service of remembrance, acknowledgment and commitment.

The service was committed to honoring the work and memory of Dr. King while challenging those gathered to do something to carry on the dream and promise of Dr. King. Rev. Winterbourne Harrison-Jones, pastor of Witherspoon Presbyterian Church, delivered the sermon which included significant portions of the sermon Dr. King had planned to give on the Sunday that followed his death. The sermon title was "Why American May Go to Hell: Moral Imagination and the Danger of Being on the Wrong Side of History." The message was clear that everyone should use their Christian foundation to assess their own lives and that of their neighbors and ask, "What can I do to make our country treat all its citizens equally?" Rev. Harrison-Jones clearly stated that without true and unambiguous equality, the title of the sermon would become America's destiny.

The sermon was preceded with remembrances, song and Scripture. The sermon was followed by challenges from Jewish, Hispanic, African, Muslim and Christian representatives to the gathered body. The challenges described multiple inequities directly impacting each represented community and the damage it is doing to America.

Finally, the voice of future leaders, represented by A.J. Young, invited everyone to visit the multiple organizations setup in the Gym that represented varied needs throughout the community.

Organizers of the event, Justice Advocates in White Water Presbytery, were pleased with the event and the enthusiasm of all attendees. However, no one will truly be satisfied until the change called for that evening becomes a reality. # One Hundred Heroes

*As part of its centennial celebration, United Way of Central Indiana asked the community to nominate any person who raised a hand to help others and made a positive impact in the community. What came out of this was “100 Heroes” of our community. We are proud to let you know that Tab’s Mission Director, Paula Means, was nominated for this honor. **P**aula Means (formerly Paula Parker-Sawyers) has dedicated her life to making health a priority in Indianapolis. Throughout her career, she’s championed for increasing health standards and reducing infant mortality rates.

Means credits her parents and grandparents for inspiring her to get involved in community service. Her father was a professional musician who knew the community well. He eventually went into politics, which opened Means’ eyes to “the community and its needs and wants.” Her mother was a champion in the community with the Girl Scouts, while her grandmother raised more than 100 children through babysitting. “I had wonderful role models who taught me the importance of giving back even when you feel you have nothing to give back,” she said.

While growing up during the Civil Rights Era, Means became one of the first African-Americans to graduate

from Northwest High School and was an Indianapolis 500 Princess. During this time, she was incredibly influenced by the work of Marvella Bayh and Esther Bray - women who gave of themselves through political service from different sides of the aisle. “They realized the goal is the same even if we may be on different sides,” she said.

Inspired by these dynamic women, Means dedicated herself to political service. She has spent decades focusing on health in Indianapolis; first in her role of City-County Councilwoman and later as the first female deputy mayor of Indianapolis and leader of the Indiana Office of Faith-Based and Community Initiatives. Her charge as deputy mayor was to reduce the infant mortality rate; something she is still passionate about today. “We continue to have babies die before they reach the age of one. As a community we fail in our efforts to keep that from happening. Infant mortality is a measure of the community’s overall health. We aren’t there yet.” Means is also concerned about the disparate impact of infant mortality in minority communities. “African-American children are two times as likely to die as opposed to their Caucasian counterparts. For us to be strong as a community we must make health a priority.”

Means embodies what it means to be an unsung hero, advocate and engaged citizen, and she encourages others to do the same. “Identify your own personal passion and have a love for that passion that goes beyond everyday activities. This is what keeps you going even when you are tired. Passion is key.”

### Parking Lot Update

After several meetings between the Parking Lot Committee and the architects, the design package was completed and submitted to the City in April for permitting, and to the contractors for their initial review.

In early May, the committee will host a pre-bid meeting for the interested contractors to come inspect the site and ask questions about the design. Their bids will then be due by May 10. After our engineer has summarized the results, the committee will meet to discuss the various options and determine who will be awarded the work. The results will then be presented to the Facilities Committee for approval at their meeting in May. If all goes as planned, the committee would then plan to bring a proposal for Session action to proceed at their meeting in May.

Part of the bid process will be the contractor's proposed schedule for completing all of the work. Once we have that information, we will be able to finalize and begin communicating how we plan to maintain our daily and weekend operations during this season of construction.
