Pastoral Reflection

"In Person" Worship Begins July 19

Dear Friends,

Hard as it is to believe, we have not worshiped together in person since Sunday, March 8. Thank you for your patience, faithfulness, words of encouragement and expressions of support as we (the staff and Session) have tried to navigate what it means to be the Church in the time of pandemic.

At the June Session meeting, it was discussed and decided that it is reasonable to plan to offer an "in person" worship option starting Sunday, July 19, in addition to our regular "live streaming" service. This, pending any new information regarding the progression of the pandemic.

There will be many more communications regarding what "in person" worship will look like as we near that date, but here are the basics:

- **One worship service at 10:00 a.m.** The service will be "live streamed," but we will also welcome "in person" worshipers, including families and children, up to our mandated seating capacity, (75-100 people).
- **Registration for attendance** in worship will be required so that we don't exceed our maximum occupancy to allow for safe social distancing. Registration details will follow.
- **Studies show that those in the more advanced age groups are more vulnerable, so in accordance with CDC guidelines**, for now we would ask persons over 65 with a high-risk or underlying health condition to consider continuing to worship with us via "live-streaming." Individuals with known COVID-19 exposure in the past 14 days, are ill or symptomatic, and those who are anxious about being in a group setting **should not attend** "in person" worship. This is not a "faith issue;" it is a matter of safety and health; yours and others.
- **Checking your temperature before you leave home** is encouraged. Anyone with a temperature over 100.4 should stay home.
- **Masks will be required at all times** while in the building and will be provided if you don't have one. This is an act of caring and for the protection of those around you, not for you.
- **Hand sanitizers** will be available as you enter and exit the Sanctuary.
- **Social distancing (6 feet)** will be required both in seating and in clustering before and after the service. Pews will be marked and ushers will help monitor entrance and exit.
- **Ingress and egress** will be through the main doors off of 34th Street only. Enter by the center aisle, exit by the side aisles. Worshipers are encouraged to park at Raphael Health Center.
- There will be **no congregational singing, passing of the peace, passing of pew pads, bulletins, collection plates, Bibles or hymnals.**
- Children are welcome in worship with their parents, but for the time being there will be **no Sunday School classes, child or nursery care or coffee fellowship.**
- There will be **limited access to restroom facilities. Except for the Sanctuary, the remainder of the building will be inaccessible.**
- Prior to and following each service of worship, **our custodial staff will sanitize all frequently-touched surfaces.**

We appreciate your willingness to "*love your neighbor*" by adhering to each of these guidelines. If you have questions or concerns please feel free to contact me, any staff member or Elder. We would be happy to visit with you.

Missions Report

Freewheelin' Bikes

One of the sure harbingers of summer break is the presence of kids on bicycles. One of my fondest childhood memories includes riding my bike to the community pool with my friends. It was the ultimate definition of freedom and fun.

As a parent, my heart holds close the memories of my own children and their bikes: their determination to figure out how to get on their first tricycle; their inexpressible joy and pride the day the training wheels came off; the togetherness of family rides around the campground; and yes, even the tears of the inevitable accidents that are a rite of passage.

My greatest bicycle memory, though, occurred in August 2017, standing on the lawn of the United States Capitol Building, as we cheered the arrival of our son, Mark, and 99 other Pi Kappa Phi brothers at the completion of The Journey of Hope (a 10-week, cross country bicycle ride to raise funds and awareness for adults with disabilities). It was not only a moment of parental pride but a true glimpse of how something as simple as a bicycle can be a tool to transform lives.

Now, let me be clear, I am not an avid cyclist by any stretch of the imagination. I have a "step-through" bike that gets me around the neighborhood just fine. I am, however, a believer that there is something really special about the cycling community, particularly when it comes to "doing good" for others.

I saw it first-hand the summer of 2017 and I am reminded every time I am in my office. Granted, I have a partially obstructed view of the mural on the side of the Freewheelin' Community Bikes building. Still, I know that on the other side of the artwork is a very special place where the lives of youth in our community are being transformed by kind, compassionate people and their bikes!

Our ministry partner, Freewheelin' Community Bikes, is not just a local bike shop, although they do sell and repair bikes. It is, at the heart, a youth development program that imparts both life and leadership skills to young people while teaching the marketable trade of bicycle mechanics. The youth may participate in one of four unique programs: Green Apron/Earn-A-Bike, Advanced Bicycle Mechanics



Classes, Youth Education and Employment Training (YEET), and Bike Lab. Each provides confidence-boosting, hands-on experience, and meaningful mentorship with volunteers and staff. Learn more here: <https://www.freewheelinbikes.org/>.

By the way, this summer, the view from the best office in the church offers the added bonus of watching the young mechanics at work. The programming will be held under the shade trees of Tab's park so the youth can maintain proper precautions and distancing while earning their green apron and bike.

Tab will also be the launch site for the annual fundraiser "Nancy's Ride" on Labor Day, September 7. My office would offer a great view of this but I'll be on the ground coordinating the send-off. In the meantime, I can't believe I am saying this - seeing all the kids and their bikes have me thinking about trying one of the family-friendly Saturday morning community rides at 10:00 a.m. Do any friends want to join me? It could give a whole new meaning to summer freedom and fun!

Tabernacle is and has been an important partner for the UMOJA Project. Your mission support allows us to continue our programs. However, this year your support was critical and needed more than ever due to the COVID-19 Pandemic and the hardships it has caused to our UMOJA families in Kenya. The funds that were given for the Emergency Relief purchased grains to support our families.

The A-Maizing Lunch is an annual event at Tabernacle and supports the school lunch program. This year it was delayed to accommodate the mission trip and then COVID-19. We tried the first-ever Virtual A-Maizing Lunch with the help of Dave Streit for his video expertise, Kathy and Greg Miller for serving as a host, Joyce Peipert and Marsha Robinson for sharing their witness. If you haven't watched the video yet, please do (at youtube.com/user/tabindy). It is a great way to learn about the project. Tabernacle stepped up as usual for the lunch and raised over \$5,000 which will go to our food security program. ASANTE SANA.

We were able to distribute grains to EVERY SINGLE UMOJA child from May 20 to May 23. This is the third distribution we have made and this last was the most comprehensive. It was to last through the first week of June. Now that we know school will be delayed until September, we will be having another distribution starting the week of June 15.

Each distribution point had a check-in to make sure we were servicing our beneficiaries. Head teachers, link teachers, alumni, and former project assistants volunteered to help in the distribution. Face masks and social distance precautions were utilized to keep everyone safe. We even received two donations of cooking oil and sugar from community members to add to the maize and omena (fish) that we purchased for that day.

Protocols For Reopening “In Person” Worship During COVID-19 Pandemic Tabernacle Presbyterian Church

For implementation for “in person” worship services in addition to “live streamed” services

This is what we are asking **you** to agree to for a safe worship environment:

- **Do not attend “in person” worship** if you have a high-risk or underlying health condition, are in a “high risk group,” have a fever (100.4°F), have symptoms or have been exposed to someone testing positive for COVID-19 within the last 14 days
- **You are required to wear a mask** while in the building and throughout the worship service for the benefit of other worshipers
- Practice social distancing (6 feet) and sit only in designated spaces
- Do not bring food or drinks into the Sanctuary
- Please do not gather before or after the service
- Follow designated ingress and egress patterns-- main doors off of 34th Street only
- Follow directions or guidance of ushers

This is what **we** are going to do in order to provide for a safe worship environment:

- Clean and electro-statically sanitize the Sanctuary prior to the commencement of “in person” worship services
- Clean the Sanctuary and used spaces after each service
- Clean and monitor restrooms
- Provide hand sanitizers at entrances and masks upon request
- Provide pre-packaged communion elements
- Provide collection box for pledges, tithes, offerings etc.
- Provide electronic bulletins and screens for order of worship

The following will be “on hold” until further notice:

- Congregational singing
- Sunday School and Childcare
- Coffee conversation
- Printed bulletins, hymnals, Bibles, pew pads, pew cushions, collection plates
- Passing of the peace during and Pastors Greeting before and after service
- Complete access to drinking fountains, restrooms and other areas of the building
- Greeting of Pastors and Staff

Live-streaming will continue to be available at 10:00 a.m. on Sunday mornings.

- Please note: These protocols may change often, quickly and with minimal notice.

July 2020 Read Through the Bible
