Pastoral Reflection

Praying Familiar Passages of Scripture

Dear Friends,

I don't know about you, but periodically I find it difficult to find the right words as I pray. Sometimes I feel like the little boy whose mother overheard him saying the alphabet as he knelt beside his bed saying his nighttime prayers. "What are you doing?" she asked him. He said, "I didn't know what to pray so I'm just letting God put the words together for me."

In those times when I don't know what or how to pray, I often turn to familiar passages of Scripture:

"I lift up my eyes to the hills, from where will my help come?" (Psalm 121)

"The Lord is my Shepherd, I shall not want." (Psalm 23)

"Who can separate us from the love of God which is ours in Christ Jesus our Lord." (Romans 8)

Meet Lezlie Laxton

When you first meet and talk with Lezlie Laxton, it would probably surprise you that she was born and raised in the south. There's not a trace of a southern accent in her voice! Born in Arkansas and raised in Mississippi, Lezlie is the second born of five girls.

In her early twenties, Lezlie enlisted in the Air Force and moved from Mississippi to Denver. It was there that she met her now ex-husband and married. Together, they lived in many different locations, including Germany, Texas, North Carolina, Toronto, and Illinois before settling in Indianapolis in 2002. Along the way, their family grew with the birth of their two daughters, Andrea and Katie.

During her time in the Air Force, Lezlie worked on air-to-air missiles on F-15 aircraft. She later worked in retail. During their years in North Carolina, Lezlie went to work for Dillard's Department Stores in the Human Resources Department. When she moved to Indianapolis, she took a position in HR with the Eiteljorg Museum of American Indians and Western Art. She continues in that role today.

Following her separation in 2005 and subsequent divorce, Lezlie's father moved in with her, and she helped care for him during a five-year period of declining health until his passing.

Lezlie also was seeking an opportunity to make her faith more active. She attended church throughout her life having been raised in the Baptist church. After attending a Great Banquet for the first time, she began volunteering in the organization of future banquets.

Lezlie visited Tab for the first time in 2012, and as many others have experienced at our church, she was quickly encouraged by the warmth and friendliness of those she met that first day. She remembers attending Sunday school that day and meeting Dan and Elizabeth Hamilton, which began a long collaboration with them by serving in Adult Ministries.

Lezlie has served at Tab in several different roles for many years. In addition to teaching Adult Ministries classes, she has served as an Elder and on the Human Resources committee. She has also been an integral part of the Women's Ministries group.

Lezlie is looking ahead to retirement, which she is planning some time in the next five years. Last year, she purchased a new home and has been actively renovating the house and the garden since moving in. Lezlie comes from a family of creative talents, so part of her renovation work involves establishing a dedicated craft room. She is gifted at making jewelry and at woodworking, but her real passion is in carving ostrich eggs.

In addition to more creative time, Lezlie looks forward to more family time in retirement. Her daughters both live in the greater Atlanta area, and she has a ten-year-old grandson, Harley, who is the light of her life.



Spotlight

An Overview: The Color of Compromise Summer Discussion Series

George Floyd. Breonna Taylor. Ahmaud Aubrey. These three names were part of a tipping point that pushed conversations and protests on racial justice to the forefront of our communities, while we continued to wrestle with the unknowns of a global health pandemic. Social media posts reflected the sense of being overwhelmed, “This is all too much,” while others shared thoughts that a societal shutdown provided a much-needed pause to allow a thoughtful focus on this destructive dynamic that continues to plague our country.

One of Tab’s first responses to the current spotlight on racism was to offer a seven-week class in July and August that explored *The Color of Compromise* by Jemar Tisby. If you think the book’s subtitle, “The Truth About the American Church’s Complicity in Racism” indicates a difficult read, you’re right. Archbishop Desmond Tutu once said, “True reconciliation exposes the awfulness, the abuse, the hurt, the truth.”

Tisby’s book was selected after receiving positive reviews from the editorial boards of Christianity Today and the Gospel Coalition. Quoting writer Daniel K. Williams in his review on GospelCoalition.org, “Racial reconciliation, Tisby argues, won’t occur without confession of sin and repentance from white Christians - a repentance that some Reformed churches have already started to model, but which hasn’t yet occurred en masse. With God’s grace, it can occur. For those seeking a better understanding of what this confession and repentance might entail, Tisby’s book offers a helpful guide.”

Another factor in selecting this book was the accompanying video series available through RightNow Media and Amazon Prime Video. For many of the weeks, group members would read the assigned chapters as well as watch the videos, commenting that their experience was enhanced by hearing the author’s voice.

Conversations about racism are weighted with personal experience and unconscious bias, so to help keep the shared experience moving forward, five guardrails were introduced and applied weekly. The guardrails included the following:

- Grace: We sought to reflect God’s grace to use toward one another.
- Humility: We participated knowing that our perspective is limited.
- Mixed Bags: We admit that we are all mixed bags in terms of our thoughts, opinions and deeds.
- Living in the tension of two opposite things being true: We recognize that people and institutions can and often do simultaneously offer the good, the bad, and the ugly.



- Blind Spots: We acknowledge that our neighbor’s blind spots are easier to see than our own.

Each week, comments were offered around two main questions:

1. What was hard to read?
2. Why was it hard?

This framework was created to encourage participants to make a personal application with the material. This structure also took into account the diversity of our backgrounds and experience with similar conversations.

The last chapter of the book is titled, “The Fierce Urgency of Now,” words inspired by Martin Luther King’s *I Have a Dream* speech in which he says, “We have also come to this hal-
lowed spot to remind America of the fierce urgency of now.” To guide our next steps, Tisby suggests looking to the ARC (Awareness, Relationships, Commitment) of racial justice for identifying antiracist actions. “They are not formulaic; they can happen nonsequentially and simultaneously. Nor should this process ever be considered complete.”

Tab’s Team for Racial Justice is now pursuing other programs and opportunities to continue the conversation. MICROSCHOOL PROJECT

As you may have already heard, Tab will be hosting 20 IPS students from Tab Tutoring and a few member children in our "Microschool Project." We'll be providing supervision and support for students to do their distance learning while IPS is closed to all in-person learning. One of the big parts of our mission at Tab is interacting with and supporting our neighbors and our community. In this time when so many parents are between a rock and a hard place with the need to work and having their school-age children at home, this is a pragmatic way that we can come alongside the families from our congregation, and from our tutoring program with whom we already have a relationship to offer our friendship, time and resources. There are three main ways that Tab members can help with this endeavor: We need adult "proctors" who are willing to supervise a small group of five students (the same students each time you participate, to keep the contact circle small) from 8:15 am-12:30 pm for at least two mornings a week. The plain truth is that without enough adult help, we can't provide this program for the students who really need it. While you can proctor as a volunteer, we're also offering a pay rate of \$15 per hour for the proctor position. OR you can donate individually wrapped breakfast or snack items (no peanuts, please!) and/or backpacks in which the students can take their laptops or tablets to and from Tab. Missions Report

Everyone Needs a Room - View Optional

In just a few days, I will celebrate my one year anniversary as Tab's Missions Director. It doesn't seem possible that I have now been at the best job in the best office in the building for 365 days! Evidently, despite my initial concern that any day I would be told I was in the wrong office, this really is going to be my "home away from home." What a blessing! I guess it's safe to finish unpacking and start adding my personal decorative touches to the place.

As I ponder this milestone from the view of this best office, I am sobered by the reality that my increasing sense of security in this place and my desire to make the office more warm and homelike, are both trivial and luxurious compared to the very real housing and security worries of our neighbors.

According to data culled by Stout Risius Ross, LLC, approximately 44% of all renters in Indiana are currently at risk of eviction. Furthermore, estimates indicate that evictions in the US for the month of August will outnumber the total for the entire year in 2016. Experts currently predict that as many as 40 million Americans may fall victim to the current eviction crisis, placing it on par with the Great Depression.

Quite honestly, the magnitude of this housing crisis is unfathomable for most of us. Even more so, the implications are equally as difficult to comprehend. An eviction creates instability in the life of the tenant, often rendering them homeless, helpless, or both; however, the collateral damage of an eviction can be devastating. Without a secure place to live, belongings are often sold or abandoned. Without a place to safely sleep at night, jobs are lost, as is the ability to seek them; children are unable to attend school (in-person or virtually); health is compromised; and a record of judgment is recorded - one that will follow the tenant for at least a year or more, therefore limiting access to future housing.

The downward spiral is swift and steep. It is overwhelming and frightening, to both the renters and to those of us who are convicted by our faith to actively care for the poor and shelter the homeless. The truth is, there are no easy answers. Even our best efforts can seem inadequate, yet compassion and faith compel us to keep trying. To love our neighbors as ourselves means to want them to also have a secure shelter, particularly during a pandemic. To help provide the shelter is a means of doing for "one of the least of these" (Matthew 25:40).

This month Tab Missions has offered two opportunities for the church family to "do" the good that we can. The first is with our long-time mission partner, Habitat for Humanity, who is offering unique ways to engage and support them from home. The second will be with our new mission friends at Family Promise, in partnership with Northminster and Orchard Park Presbyterian Churches, as we provide specific household items for transitional/emergency apartments.

Of course, a financial donation to any of the local shelters that provide emergency housing is always a quick and easy start to making an immediate impact on those in crisis. Most assuredly, the needs of these agencies will only grow greater in the weeks and months to come, and every contribution will make a difference. These other opportunities, however, are geared toward longer-term solutions to housing stability. A faithful and faith-filled response to the impending housing crisis must address both the crisis and the need for on-going stability. By God's grace, we are blessed to be able to do both!
