Pastoral Reflection

We Are Telling the Story

Dear Friends,

Several years ago I read a newspaper article about a tornado that hit a small town. The caption under the headline read, “Tornado that destroyed the Presbyterian Church did no damage to the city.”

I know the headline was intended to be heard as good news for the city, but it raised questions for me as to the impact and influence that church had on the community. I began to wonder, “If Tab were hit by a tornado would the city around us be damaged, affected, suffer some loss? I believe it would. One of the ways a church, or any organization, can measure its impact and influence is by asking “How would the community around it be changed if it were not there?” I believe, and I pray continually, that we are living into our God-given calling by “being a light for Christ” and making a difference for Christ in the Mapleton-Fall Creek Neighborhood and throughout the metropolitan area.

In the coming weeks, we will begin hearing about the stewardship opportunities that are ours in 2021. Our theme this year is “**Gratitude for Giving.**” Both gratitude to God for His faithful provision and to the Tab family and friends for your generous support of our mission and ministry.

As we talk about stewardship and opportunities for the support, we are talking far more about faith-sharing than we are fund-raising. Through our giving, we become participants in sharing the Gospel message near and far.

Some of you will remember the name Charles Kuralt, a CBS Evening News contributor, who did an *On The Road* story about a man named John Fling. John Fling lived in Columbia, South Carolina, and wherever he went he wore a cap that read, “I love to tell the story.” What made his a good “human interest story” is that John didn’t ever really tell the story. He was too busy living the story.

John was an auto parts delivery man who also delivered groceries to the blind, medicine to the homebound, money to the needy and food to the hungry. He didn’t discriminate. He gave to anybody in need. He gave his money, and he even gave his socks. For forty years John was a one-man social service agency.

Kuralt was so intrigued by this fellow that he asked him, “Why do you do it?”

John replied, “Why? I do it because...,” then he paused, searching for an answer, “I don’t know why. I just...I guess it’s just the responsibility maybe a fellow feels that he has of...Christ says pick up your cross and follow Me. He didn’t say how far it was expected to be carried. He didn’t say how heavy it was. He didn’t even say what description it would come in. He just said, ‘Pick it up and follow Me.’”

However you choose to “pick up the cross and follow,” by your words and your actions, by your giving and your living, may it be for you, not a burden, but a privilege. In so many ways, you, and we together, are “telling the story” and making a difference for Jesus Christ in this community and around the globe.

Students Are Learning Online at Tab

Tab's microschool project has gotten off to a good start! We began classes on September 3, and the students are settled in and doing good work. We have 20 students on our roster, eleven adult proctors working with the students (six per day in two classrooms); and numerous other volunteers who have come alongside to help with check-in, preparing and serving lunch, and donating backpacks and breakfast items. Tab was fortunate enough to receive a \$10,000 grant from an organization called The Mind Trust which works to support and strengthen public schools. The grant will help to cover the cost of paying our proctors. In addition to the morning e-learning and two meals each day, Tab is also offering a sports and recreation program specifically for the microschool students on Tuesday and Thursday afternoons from 12:30 pm to 3:00 pm. Thanks to all of you who are supporting this program with your time, your donations, and especially with your prayers!

TAB ENDOWMENT FUND

2020 is a year like no other that provides unprecedented opportunity to bless others through your charitable giving. There are eternal, personal, and financial rewards to tax-wise planned giving. Following are two tips.

- You can direct that your Required Minimum Distribution (RMD) from your IRA be given directly to Tabernacle Presbyterian’s Endowment Fund, or to Tab directly. This will save you income taxes since your RMD will NOT be included in your taxable income.

- Also, when you consider your estate plan, be sure that your assets have the appropriate beneficiary designation. Naming the appropriate beneficiary for each asset is more important than ever after the passage of the SECURE Act this year. Your heirs are no longer able to stretch out payment of the income tax on your IRA over their lifetimes. Consequently, your heirs will pay more income taxes on your inherited IRA. This can be avoided by proper planning.

More money will pass to your family and greater amounts can be left for God’s kingdom work if you name your favorite charities, such as Tab’s Endowment, as beneficiary of your IRA and name your family or heirs as beneficiary of your non-IRA savings.

Then and Now

In a few short months, Tabernacle Presbyterian Church will begin celebrating its 100th year anniversary of the official move from Meridian and 11th

Street to 34th and Central. As part of that celebration, Ruth McDonald has begun pouring through some of the old documents and archives from that period. Throughout the next several months we will share some of those tidbits of information that we have run across that we think you might find interesting, humorous, and maybe even insightful! Here are a couple recently found - one published in the Indianapolis Star in 1918 and the second one found in the archives of Tab regarding the Spanish Flu pandemic of 1918!

From the October 7, 1918 edition of the *Indianapolis Star* - “Indianapolis schools, churches, theaters, and moving picture houses were ordered closed and a ban was placed on all public gatherings yesterday by the city health board. The order is effective this morning and will be in effect for an indefinite period.” From the Tab archives - “The first World War was still in progress when he (Dr. Dunkel) came. In the early Fall of 1918, an epidemic of Influenza swept over the country. The first Sunday in October everyone was compelled to wear a gauze mask at the service. It was certainly a ghostly looking assemblage. The other three Sundays in October the churches were all closed by order of the Board of Health. This was a discouraging time for Dr. Dunkel for he had many plans he wanted to put into effect. However, it gave him an opportunity to get things ready for motion which he had in his mind.”

Who says history doesn’t repeat itself? We’ve been here before!

The Good Work of Justice

Over the past several weeks, the best office at Tab has become a quiet place for reading and participating in webinars on the subject of racial justice as I lean into my role as part of the Tab Racial Justice Team. The remoteness of the office makes it a safe place to process the feelings and emotions that arise as I learn things that are difficult to hear, yet are so important to facing my own bias, misinformation, and complicity (even if just via silence) in systemic racism. Truth is, pursuing racial justice is not easy work. It is not comfortable work. It is not just about gaining more information. Nor is it a political matter. Racial justice work - becoming anti-racist - is a matter of personal transformation. It is an awakening of the heart to be healed and set free of the sin of racism and the untruths that perpetuate it even today. It is also necessary work in order to fully live the gospel in our own lives, to do the most Christ-honoring ministry possible in this diverse community, to establish the most authentic relationships with our neighbors, and to facilitate the healing of our collective broken spirit. In her book *The Inner Work of Racial Justice: Healing Ourselves and Transforming Our Communities Through Mindfulness*, Rhonda V. Magee offers Seven Foundations of Racial Justice Work that I have found helpful in my own wrestling with systemic racism. In addition, the Tab Racial Justice team believes these capture the spirit with which Tab must approach this powerful, messy, redeeming, conciliatory work of rooting out and dismantling structural racism, and we will do our best to foster them along the way.

1. An Openness to Explore Without Judgment (or being as nonjudgmental as possible)
2. Loving-kindness toward self and others
3. Compassion
4. Patience
5. A "Don't Know Mind" - (willingness to live with inevitable uncertainty)
6. Steadfastness - the capacity to stay in the struggle, to resist the urge to draw lines or walk away
7. Courage to Seek and Act for Justice
