


SUNDAY WORSHIP SCHEDULE



Pastoral Reflection

A Lament Is Simply a Cry

Dear Friends,

Yesterday (January 19) I watched as now President Biden and Vice-President Harris led the nation in a service of remembrance honoring the 400,000 plus Americans who have lost their lives to the Covid -19 virus. It was a simple, solemn, very meaningful ceremony bathed in the light of lanterns lining the Reflection Pool in our nation's capitol. As one spoke, we are joined together in our loss and sorrow, as a nation, as a community, as families and as a church family.

Reflecting on that beautiful service I am reminded of Psalm 13, a Psalm of Lament, as are over 1/3 of the 150 Psalms. A lament is simply a cry, a cry for help, a cry for healing, a cry to God, spoken by an individual or on behalf of a nation. The laments recorded for us in Scripture can help us find words to pray when words fail us as we cry to God on behalf of another, our nation, ourselves.

Read again Psalm 13 and insert your own cries using the words of the Psalmist:

1 How long, O LORD? Will you forget me forever? How long will You hide Your face from me?
2 How long must I bear pain in my soul, and have sorrow in my heart all day long? How long shall my enemy be exalted over me?
3 Consider and answer me, O LORD my God!
Give light to my eyes, or I will sleep the sleep of death,
4 and my enemy will say, "I have prevailed," my foes will rejoice because I am shaken,
5 But I trusted in Your steadfast love; my heart shall rejoice in Your salvation.
6 I will sing to the LORD, because He has dealt bountifully with me.

What I so appreciate about the laments is their honesty. The Psalmist is brutally honest in his cries to God, as can we be. As a parent listens to the broken-hearted cries of their children, so God listens to our cries because we are His children.

But then look again at how the Psalm ends (verse 6). After cries of "How long?" and "Why aren't You answering?" (words we have perhaps spoken to God as well), the Psalmist sings, "BUT I have trusted in Your steadfast love; my heart shall rejoice in Your salvation. I will sing to the Lord, because He has dealt bountifully with me."

The lament ends on a note of hope and faith in the steadfast love of God. Even in the darkness, the light of hope shines; not wishful thinking, but hope grounded in the faithfulness and love of God.

In a very few weeks, on February 17, we will celebrate Ash Wednesday marking the beginning of Lent. In that service, symbolized by ashes placed on our foreheads, we hear the chilling refrain, "from dust you have come unto dust you shall return." That is the honest cry of lament.

But Ash Wednesday is not the end of the story just as "How long?" or "Why have you forgotten me?" is not the end of the lament. The service of ashes, the cry of lament, points us toward the celebration of the Easter Day, the day of God's raising Jesus from the dead, the day which reminds us, more than any other, of God's faithfulness and love.

We are going through a difficult time still, but this is not the end of the story. As we share our suffering, so we also share our hope.

Seeking clarity about our identity and worth as a Child of God is a key component of a church's discipleship program. This is especially true for a congregation that continues to experience trauma associated with a global health pandemic.

As we move into a new calendar year, Tab's Spiritual Growth & Development Team (formerly Adult Ministries) invites you to participate in our first annual spiritual growth campaign: Rooted in Grace. This discipleship program is an easy-access point that will offer intentional classes, workshops, and personal reflection to answer the question: How do I grow in truth regarding my identity and purpose?

Throughout the year we will encourage you to assess this growth in your own life. The Spiritual Growth & Development Team will be offering a three-statement identity card to reflect on the degree to which God's truth is transforming our hearts.

The three statements are: I am known and accepted by God. I am secure in Jesus Christ. I am significant in Jesus Christ.



Then and Now

On September 23, 1851, 22 members of First Presbyterian Church organized at the home of Caleb Scudder, the mayor of Indianapolis, to form Third Presbyterian Church. Services were held in the old school presbytery, College Hall, then in Temperance Hall on West Washington Street between Illinois and Meridian Streets.

Within a year, a lot at the northeast corner of Illinois and Ohio Streets was purchased on which to build. The church building project was done in two phases and completed in 1859 and attendance necessitated yet another addition in 1866. The congregation began six Sabbath Schools throughout the city, some of which later became organized churches.

In 1875, Third's membership dropped substantially due to members moving farther away from the church, no longer a reasonable walking distance.

On July 12, 1883, in preparation for the church's seventh pastorate, the name was changed to *The Tabernacle Church*. The pastor candidate who had insisted on the change refused the call but the name stayed and membership grew. A new lot was purchased at the corner of Meridian and 2nd Streets (now 11th Street), known to be the best residential district of the city, and a temporary chapel constructed. Spending over \$26,000, a brick, 1,000seat sanctuary was constructed in 1886 with a new chapel and Sunday school rooms added later. By 1894, the nearly 1,000 members of The Tabernacle Church made the church one of Indiana's largest.

The next pastor, Dr. J. Cumming Smith, being concerned that the Bible was not getting its proper emphasis in the day's school curriculum, helped organize Tudor Hall (which became Park Tudor School). This was an elite boarding school for girls through high school.

Dr. Smith served as the dean of the school, along with his church work. The girls attended Sunday worship services at the church. When he died suddenly at the age of 46, the church members paid off Tabernacle's \$19,000 debt as a memorial to Smith's service (there is a large bronze plaque in Dr. Smith's memory at the narthex entrance to our Sanctuary).

In the fall of 1910, the first employee was hired to assist the pastor. Miss Emma Anderson became the Sunday School Visitor spending afternoons in the homes of church and Sunday school families. It was during this time that church Sunday schools were divided by age. The basement of the church was excavated to facilitate much-needed meeting places. Women's work in the church began with the Tabernacle Auxiliary, first as an Aid Society, while the Men's Club took responsibility for visitation of the congregation.

In 1918 Dr. J. Ambrose Dunkel accepted the call to pastor Tabernacle Church. He was the first to create a church office within the building. Dr. Dunkel considered Sunday school one of the most important parts of church work. While visiting families in the northern part of the city, he realized this area had no Sunday school in the area. Unable to find a building to rent in the vicinity for that purpose, the northwest corner of 34th Street and Central Avenue was purchased for \$24,000 even though other lots were considered.

Missions Report Knowing We Are Loved

Occasionally while playing the back and forth "I love you" game with my children, I would throw in a challenge question: "Who else loves you?"

With encouragement and probing from me, this question would lead to a litany of names including Daddy, all four grandparents, various aunts, uncles, friends, neighbors, teachers, God and each of the pets.

As the kids got older, I added a different follow-up question: "How do you know I love you?"

Initially their response was the obvious and simple: "Because you tell me." However, as they grew older, I would push them to think deeper about other things that caused them to feel loved.

Eventually the answers expanded to include obvious gestures of provision: "because you feed me; because you help me with my homework; because you take me to school every day; because you let me eat snacks!" (What a good mom!)

The most profound responses, though, were those that described love as an act of presence and grace: "because you listen to my stories, because you go to my ballgames and cheer for me, because when I break something, you aren't mean to me."

This exercise was not devised to stroke our parental ego (although, what parent doesn't need a little ego boost from their toddler?). Instead, it was meant to ensure that our children learned, as early in life as possible, that they were loved by many people, even on the days when life doesn't feel loving. It also planted a seed of truth that love is about so much more than the words we say.

Reflecting on this early childhood game, I am curious about how it might inform missions and ministry at Tab. More specifically, how could we help folks to become aware of their Belovedness? How do we ensure our neighbors know that God loves them and so do we? Which actions speak "love" the loudest?

I don't pretend to have all the answers, but I do believe many are found in those last responses the kids offered. Loving our neighbors, conveying their belovedness (even when the world doesn't affirm it), happens most profoundly when we are fully present, when we are listening to their

stories, when we offer encouragement, and when we genuinely appreciate what's important to them even when it is not familiar to us or part of our experience.

Encouraging Tab in this way of loving others, love that is rooted in relationships and respect, is a priority of the Mission Committee this year. As the pandemic eventually wanes, we anticipate our opportunities to practice loving our neighbors in person will increase. In the meantime, there is a way to get started now with our ministry partner, Circles Indy.

In February, four men and four women, known as Circle Leaders, will graduate from the "Getting Ahead" class, ready to be matched with an ally or two to form a "circle of support." The Circles ally embodies love for the Circle Leader by being present as an intentional friend. Allies listen, encourage, offer connections and provide emotional support as the Circle Leader strives to "get ahead in life" and break the bondage of their poverty.

There are several Circle Leaders that are waiting to be matched with allies...waiting to experience the love of a true friend. The commitment is flexible; covid precautions are maintained; and ally training and coaching is provided.
