# Youth on a Mission

## Mission Stay-cation

The mission trip to Phoenix for Tab Youth was cancelled again this year due to issues surrounding the pandemic. Several of the Phoenix public schools mandated an extended summer school for their students, which resulted in Neighborhood Ministries having to change the dates of Kids Camp (where we have served the more than 500 kids that attend this program). With the COVID guidelines in place in Phoenix, Neighborhood Ministries also reduced the number of students participating from 500 to 150. As much as we prayed, tried to adjust and pivot, worked with Lenny Reel and the amazing staff at Neighborhood Ministries, it was decided that we would once again postpone our trip this year. As heart-breaking as this was for all of us (this was going to be our largest group of travelers yet—20 people traveling), we regrouped, pivoted once again, and planned some exciting opportunities for local mission work.

Welcome to the Tab Youth Group Mission-A-Day 2021 where we focused our efforts on two local ministries: Heart Change Ministries and Outreach Inc.

We spent two days at Heart Change Ministries. Heart Change is difficult to describe because they do so many things. There is a class that meets twice weekly that helps young women explore “God’s way versus man’s way,” “A wise woman builds her house...”, and “Visionary mothering.” There is also a Mother’s University that meets three days a week and teaches Biblical doctrine, parenting skills, health and hygiene, managing finances and Godly relationships. Help is also provided toward literacy, GED preparation, Driver’s Education and entrance exams and post-secondary education training. Heart Change has also invested in buying severely dilapidated houses and restoring them for women and their families to rent. Tab youth spent one day working to demolish the inside of one of these homes in preparation for skilled labor to eventually work toward restoring it. Our other day was spent participating in programming with the



women and children that Heart Change ministers to. We participated in worship, provided childcare, helped with crafts, played games and shared a lunch.

Outreach Inc. is a ministry that provides support for homeless teenagers in Marion County. There are an estimated 1,500 homeless youth between the ages of 14 and 24 in Marion County. Outreach’s mission is to equip and empower homeless teens and young adults to achieve stability and life transformation. The Tab Youth Group assisted in property projects (picking up trash, cleaning up around the building, landscape work), cooked meals, sorted donated clothing, learned more about the program and how we can support their ministry. We also participated in a simulation where we learned a lot about the challenges faced with being homeless; it was life changing and opened our hearts toward thinking about more things we can do to be helpful.

Our youth worked equally hard at both ministries but many said they especially enjoyed the time spent with the mothers and children. Our eyes were opened both to the depth of needs in our city and to the hand of God reaching out to bring people to Him. A friend recently reached out to us and said that even with all of the calamity that we have seen in the past year, GOD IS ON THE MARCH. It’s true...and we were glad to be foot soldiers for a week.



# Tab Member Spotlight

## Meet The Sturgis Family

As we approach the 100-year celebration of Tab locating to 34th and Central, we will be sharing more stories of families with long-time connections to Tab. As a happy coincidence, Tab's newest staff member, Jenny Sturgis, is a member of one of those families.

On June 1st of this year, Jenny Crichlow Sturgis joined Tab as our part-time Front Office Coordinator. Jenny represents the 5th generation of the Picken/Clark/Crichlow family of Tab members. In 1906, her great, great grandfather, William Picken, moved to Indianapolis and immediately joined Tabernacle Presbyterian Church. Since then, every generation of members of this family have been at Tab.

Jenny was born in Indianapolis. Baptized as an infant by Byron Crozier, Jenny was confirmed into membership by Rod Smith. A graduate of Broad Ripple High School, she attended college locally and obtained a BFA in Visual Communications and Design from the Herron School of Art. Later, Jenny met Dan Sturgis. Authentic "foodies," Dan and Jenny "fell in love through our mutual love of food" in visiting scores of restaurants in the Indianapolis area. After they

married, they welcomed their daughter, Lily, in 2009. One of Jenny's favorite Tab memories is of her new family lighting one of the Advent candles during the Christmas Eve service when Lily was just a newborn.

Dan is also an Indianapolis native, though his family lived in Marion, Indiana and Reading, Pennsylvania through his youth. He spent 9 years with the Army National Guard. Serving as a medic, Dan had the opportunity to travel and serve in Korea. At the end of his active duty, he returned to school at Ivy Tech to become a registered nurse. Given his military background, Dan was thrilled to be able to complete his nursing degree and work at the VA hospital in support of veterans.

While Jenny is "new" to our staff, she has worked as Tab's Nursery Coordinator for about 20 years in overseeing our infant nursery with Jennifer Wirt. She has been involved with Tab in a variety of other ways utilizing her background as a graphic designer. She has designed Tab's Stewardship Campaign brochures on several occasions. Tab has also hosted some Sacred Music Symposiums in recent years, and Jenny served as the project coordinator for these events. In addition, she is a current board member for the Mid-North Food Pantry.

Jenny's mother, Susie Crichlow, is also a long-time member of Tab. She is a member of Tab's Handbell Choir. Daughter Lily is very active in Children's Ministries. A sixth grader at Trader's Point Christian Academy, Lily is an annual performer in the Children's Ministries summer musical held each August.

Having been a lifelong member of Tab, Jenny shares that she can't really imagine going to another church. As she has grown throughout her life, her faith has grown in support of the changes that life has brought. One of her greatest sources of comfort has been learning how to lean into God as a wife and a mother.



# A Look Back

## Sanctuary Construction

In September 1919, Tabernacle formed a Building and Finance Committee for the construction of a permanent church on the lot at 34th & Central. This was to be the first large building north of Fall Creek for the city. Edgar H. Evans served as the Chairman. The committee examined the work of fourteen prominent US architects before deciding upon John William Creswell Corbusier of Cleveland, Ohio and Robert Frost Daggett of Indianapolis.

Former Tab member and architect, Jerry McMahan, researched Tab's construction in the 1990s and wrote the following:

"This brings us to the 1920s in the City of Indianapolis where a large and soon-to-be larger Presbyterian Church known as Tabernacle was being planned. It was no mistake that the Building Committee and congregation would select the Gothic as the mode of their new church home. The early Board minutes reveal that the congregation strove to build a "churchly church." In their eyes, the Gothic was much more spiritual and emotional than the more administratively-oriented Classical forms of Greek, Roman, Byzantine and others.

It was also no mistake or guess work when the people selected Corbusier and Daggett to be the architects on the project. Both were schooled in Paris, Daggett being trained at the world-famous Ecole des Beaux Arts. Furthermore, Corbusier had essentially devoted himself to the design of church structures and had numerous commissions to his credit by 1920.

Corbusier was a Cleveland-based architect who learned his trade in New York and Paris. He was considered an authority on the Gothic and widely respected for his masterful command of tracery (Tracery is the delicate stone carvings that are found in the stained-glass windows of the church).

Daggett, born in Indianapolis in 1875, attended Shortridge High School, studied at the University of Pennsylvania and the previously mentioned Ecole in Paris. His father was also an architect and was awarded the honor of Fellow in the American Institute of Architects (FAIA). His son, Robert Frost would later become the first Indiana-born FAIA. Daggett's most prominent Indianapolis works are the Indianapolis Athletic Club (1922), the Chamber of Commerce Building (1926), Jordan Hall at Butler University (1927-28), and Third



Church of Christ Scientist (1928-1929), Tab's neighbor at 34th and Washington Blvd, known today as Phillip's Temple Church.

Regardless of their previous or subsequent commissions, the architects of Tab created a masterful and "churchly" home for the congregation. It became and still is a symbol of spiritual life in the neighborhood and city."

The architect's plans provided for the erection of the Church, Chapel, and Sunday School and Community House in three units. The committee's desire was to begin building the Sanctuary immediately after the design was completed. However, with business and industrial conditions unsettled, following World War I, high material costs and the church's unknown financial future, the difficult decision was made that construction would need to wait. *continued on page 8*

## Thank You!

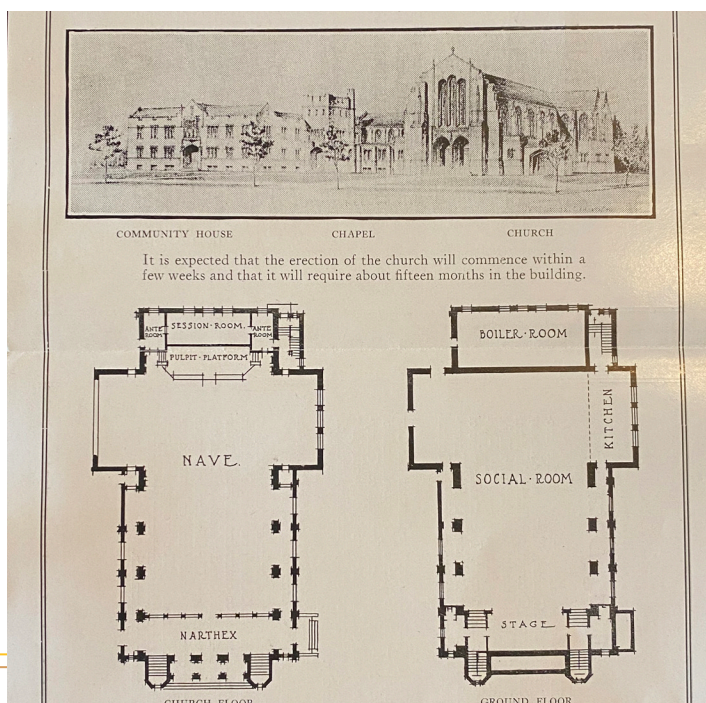
It is so great to see people returning to Tab! More of our congregation are attending worship in person, in addition to sitting in classes, Bible studies and other functions.

### *Sanctuary Construction continued*

On March 6, 1921, the plans for the estimated \$250,000 Sanctuary structure was unveiled to the congregation and pledges were accepted. The magnificent sum of \$116,000 was pledged from those in attendance in 20 minutes! Another \$96,000 was added after a second solicitation of the church body which followed shortly after.

The Ground-Breaking Ceremony was held on September 13, 1921. “Our vision of the future must begin with and continue in allegiance to our Lord and Master Jesus Christ as the Son of God and the Savior of men. With this as our central motive, the possibilities of accomplishment are almost unlimited. A structure is soon to be reared on this site—a building eminently suited to the purpose for which it is built. Beautiful in appearance, reverential in impression, useful in many ways (Edgar H. Evans).” The Sanctuary would require about 15 months to build.
