



# **Pastoral Reflection**

## Can We Talk About It?

Dear Friends,

May is "race" month and whether you are a race fan or not you can hardly help getting caught up in the hype and excitement of it all. Parties, yard decorations, the whine of high performance engines in the hanging in the air even miles from the track, Carb Day, downtown festivals and parades, thousands of visitors to our city, all leading up to "the greatest spectacle in sports" when the whole world will be watching.

Even though I am not a big race fan, I will admit to really enjoying being a casual observer of the Indy 500.

But there is another race to which I am fully committed – the "race" to follow Jesus Christ.

There are many ways one might describe the life of faith, one being the way the Apostle Paul describes it in the 3rd chapter of his letter to the Philippians, as a "race:"

"Not that I have already obtained this or have already reached the goal; but I press on to make it my own, because Christ Jesus has made me His own. Beloved, I do not consider that I have made it my own; but this one thing I do: forgetting what lies behind and straining forward to what lies ahead, I press on toward the goal for the prize of the heavenly call of God in Christ Jesus."

Most assuredly the Apostle was not thinking motorsports when he wrote those words. He was most likely thinking of a footrace such as he would have seen in the ancient pan-hellenic games which were popular in his Greco-Roman world. But his message is timeless.

In a race all the participants compete, not just against one another, but against themselves and all have the same goal in mind: to make it to the end.

The story is told of one modern Olympic marathoner who stumbled, fell and badly injured himself, but refused to withdraw from the race. He entered the arena at the end of the race so long after the others that the television cameras had been shut down and all but a few of the crowds had gone home. Surprised to see him stumbling toward the finish line, they fired up the cameras and the few remaining in attendance stood and cheered. Following the race an interviewer asked why he hadn't just given up and quit. The athlete said, "My country didn't send me 5000 miles to start the race, but to finish it."

Friends, you and I are similarly runners in a marathon or competitors in the 500 mile race of following Jesus. We are not competing against one another. Our sole purpose in starting this journey with Jesus is to finish it, so that with Paul we might say,

"I have fought the good fight, I have finished the race, I have kept the faith. From now on there is reserved for me the crown of righteousness which the Lord, the righteous Judge, will give me on that day, and not to me only but to ALL who have longed for His appearing." II Timothy 4:6-8.

So, "let us (together) press on toward the goal for the prize of the heavenly call of God in Christ Jesus."

It is my great privilege to share in this journey of faith with you.

## Meet Don & Linda Fledderjohn

At Tab, we are blessed as a church family to have so many people who volunteer their time in service to our church family and our ministries and missions. Don and Linda Fledderjohn's fingerprints can be found throughout the tapestry of Tab for many decades.

Born in Indianapolis, Don grew up near Tab. He attended Sutherland Presbyterian Church as a child. At about the age of eight, Don's father brought him to Tab to connect him with Tab's Recreation programming. That introduction led to a lifetime membership and life of service here at Tab.

Linda was also born in Indianapolis and grew up in the Glendale neighborhood. A self-proclaimed "cradle Christian," Linda grew up attending Northwood Christian Church. She and Don met while attending Broad Ripple High School. Don was active in sports, and this led him to Butler University where he played basketball under the direction of famed coach Tony Hinkle. Linda attended Indiana University for two years, and she then transferred to Butler.

Married in 1964 at Northwood, Don and Linda then began their worship life together at Tab. Linda was a senior at Butler at the time, and Don had joined his father's business, Master Glass and Color. Upon her graduation, Linda taught 1st and 2nd grade in IPS. In the coming years, they would welcome their three daughters, Heidi, Gretchen and Erica.

Don's passion for sports led him to volunteering for Tab Recreation. Don fondly remembers putting his coaching skills to work alongside Dick Gilroy. They formed a traveling Young Life basketball team of neighborhood teenagers and continued to mentor them into adulthood. He still keeps in contact with some of them. As president of Tab Community Service, Inc., Don was instrumental in raising the funds needed to install the new Tab field. This began in 2007 and finished with the second phase of the project of a new stadium and concession stand. Both projects were accomplished with the help of dedicated Tab members, the Indianapolis Colts, the Lilly Endowment and several other grants.

Don has served as an Elder on Tab's Session, as well as a member of the Endowment Committee. In addition, he served on the board of the Raphael Health Center, including three years as president. He also has been active with the Alumni Board of Butler University, and he has served on the board of Crooked Stick Golf Club. His passion is golf.

# A Look Back

## Tab Recreation—the Outstretched Hand of Christ



Did you ever wonder why Tab's campus includes a full gymnasium? In some ways, it's odd that a Gothic church building would place such emphasis on a recreational feature like that, as few churches did 100 years ago. Indeed, in 1921, when the earliest plans for the church building were developed, and once the Sanctuary wing was built, the focus was on a chapel

in the second phase, followed by a third phase which would be the Education wing. Its scope included what was referred to as a "Community House," to provide a large space for gatherings of the growing congregation and neighborhood. There was no mention of a gymnasium, per se. But in January 1924, one year after the Sanctuary was completed, Dr. J. Ambrose Dunkel approached a young 26-year-old J. Dwight Peterson and handed him \$50 (about \$850 in today's

dollars), charging him with the task of starting a recreation program. Soon enough, the Tabernacle Presbyterian Sunday School Athletic Association was organized. Membership was open to all young people, both boys and girls—which was not a very common feature back then—with annual dues of \$1. The first known activity consisted of 12 boys shooting baskets in a makeshift court within Tab's coal bin. Games were played at the old Central YMCA downtown. This humble start obviously "took" as the building plans in 1928 began referring to a "Recreational Hall," Tab's new home court. Tab was now one of the few churches in America which was sponsoring a recreation program.

But the Recreational Hall was more than just a gym for shooting hoops. The engraved words over the 34th Street entrance state it well: "For Childhood and Youth." The program's reach extended well beyond basketball; it also included "baseball, tennis, horseshoes, hikes and all forms of athletics." In 1926, a full-time "Director of Young Peoples Activities," James B. Martin, was hired to oversee the nascent program, as well as Tab's Sunday School. Martin served as director until 1940.



Throughout the late 1920s and 1930s, in the midst of the difficulties stemming from the Great Depression, Tab provided a place for many thousands of young people to pass leisure in constructive activities. Martin's many responsibilities extended over Tab's scouting program,

as well, which included two Boy Scout troops, one Girl Scout Troop, and two groups of Campfire Girls. Summer camp programs were developed, providing boys and girls with twoweek experiences at various parks and campgrounds in the State. Even kite-flying contests were part of the offerings.

Tab also organized many mixed adult activities, including exercise classes for women (known as "Trimnastics"), group projects for men and even Friday-evening roller skating parties in the Gym. The Rec Hall had been built with a fully equipped stage and Tab sponsored

> multiple plays and theatrical productions in the 1930s. A keen eye will also note, high on the Gym's south wall, some narrow slits which were designed to accommodate the projection of full-length movies, with the caveat that "only four-star pictures, those approved by Parents Magazine will be shown." For a young person, Tab offered multiple outlets to keep busy. An early program document notes that "A boy at play is a boy out of trouble-and a boy out of trouble is a boy building for

tomorrow's citizenship."

In 1940, the program took a strategic turn. The committee, concerned over repeated damage to the Gym floor, voted to cease the roller-skating parties no doubt a very good decision—and





finally painted lines on the floor to delineate the basketball court. More importantly, a couple of vacant lots at 34th and Washington Boulevard became available. Edgar Evans, who had served in so many leadership capacities over the years, made a lasting impact by largely funding the purchase of the properties on Tab's behalf. The new Evans Field greatly expanded the outdoor offerings for the Rec program, especially football and softball. Lights were added in 1948 and a third lot was secured in 1949. The expansion of the program's physical assets allowed the decision to fully open the program up to non-Tab children and to grow its community emphasis. Dr. Roy Ewing Vale summed up well the role of the Rec Program, stating that it was the "missionary arm of the church which reaches into the community." In 1949, Session endorsed the following: "We have large provision for youth, and we have welcomed girls and boys of various creeds without distinction. It is our conviction that we must not limit this program for anyone to sports alone, but that we must provide for spiritual development." This prefaced the decision to require that all participants must attend Sunday school or church of their choice at least two times a month in order to be eligible to participate. The policy, by all accounts, was well received, and made a clear statement with respect to Tab's purpose in creating and growing the program, and in demonstrating that "the church is extremely interested in them." At this point, the program had over 400 participants each year, with 30% of them coming from Tab families. After a series of multiple brief directorships, throughout the 1940s, in August 1951, a recent college graduate named Russ Earl was hired to assume the role of Recreation Director. Over the next 35 years, until his retirement in 1986, Tab Rec enjoyed explosive growth, becoming "America's Largest Church-Sponsored Recreation Program," even while weathering various storms that would buffet it in the 1960s. That story comes later.

# **Missions Spotlight**

## Open Door - Open House: Friday, May 20, 11a–12n

In May, Tab's Open Door ministry will undergo a re-launch emerging from a "pandemic pivot" model featuring primarily carry-out lunches to a completely new and different approach. In addition to the changes described in the March issue of Chimes, the Open Door Ministry Café will now offer food choices from a menu of options.

Each day, Chef André of Delectable Cuisine will prepare two choices for the main dish, four options of "side" dishes as well as bread and dessert for our diners. Of course, our hope is to foster good food and a sense of welcome and belonging that will encourage friends and neighbors to dine-in and participate in daily programming. Still, simple "to go" meals featuring a dish prepared by Second Helpings will be available for those who are unable to stay for lunch.

The vision for this new model is: "Feeding bodies and souls by providing a safe place with good food and even better conversation for the sake of authentic relationships that foster Greater Faith, Deeper Relationships and Stronger Communities." In this relational, missional model, we seek to meet a significant post-Covid need for a sense of community

and connection—which now appears to be an even greater need than mere access to food. This also gives us an opportunity and forum to connect with each other, to share joys and burdens, to pray for each other, and to participate in meaningful conversations about life, faith, God and community—the kinds of things that increase our faith and helps us know that we are not alone!

This new café will truly be an Open Door—not only a way for people to come into Tab and be served, but also a means for Tab to open ourselves to coming alongside our neighbors as we serve Christ in the community. The success of the ministry—measured by moments of connection rather than amount of food served—will not only require the presence of folks serving in the kitchen and in the dining room; we also need those willing to have a meal, sit for a while and get to know each other. ## Building Renovation Update

Spring is here, and building renovation is in full bloom! If you have not had a chance to tour the campus and church lately, here is a snap shot of things that have happened, are happening now, or will be happening in the very near future:

- The new limestone steps at the south entrance off 34th Street are 95% complete and fully functional. Some minor items are being completed in the coming days.
- Demolition work is complete on the office/bathroom interior remodeling project. You can expect to see new framing, electrical and plumbing in the coming days and weeks.
- Scaffolding is being set up on the west side of the building in anticipation of the tuck-pointing and cleaning of the

building exterior. Completion of this project will extend well into 2023 and will position the facility for continued use for decades to come!
