Pastoral Reflection

Summer Fun

Dear Friends,

During my mandatory week of Covid quarantine we began binge watching a show on the History Channel called "Alone." I don't know that I'm necessarily recommending it to you, that will be your call, but it is a reality show in which 10 men and women, trained in survival skills, are individually isolated and deposited in a remote location and challenged to "survive alone" until the last person standing.

The locations in which they are placed are remarkably challenging: the rain forest of Vancouver Island, remote Patagonia, barren regions of Alaska. They take with them minimal supplies and equipment and then are required to live off the land.

The challenges they face are many: lack of food and water, inclement weather, predators, but the one factor that challenges every contestant, even those most skilled in survival techniques, is loneliness, the sense of isolation, being alone. Invariably it is this challenge, more than food, weather or the threat of predators, that causes them to "tap out" and come home.

Again, I'm not necessarily recommending the show, but it raises a myriad of questions for me as to what it means to "survive."

God has created us to be physical, mental, spiritual and social beings. Isolate, or take any one of those away from us and we suffer and become less than God intended us to be. Contestants on the show suffer incredible stretches of days without adequate food or nutrients; the harshest of weather conditions (endless days of rain or cold); the ever present threat of predators, and they seem to do well. Many speak of the experience as being spiritually enriching, so what it is that eventually defeats them? Isolation. The lack of human contact. Solitary confinement. Being alone.

I apply this to the experience many have had, perhaps are still having, during the enduring days of the pandemic. Early on we all had to navigate the necessity of isolation and social distancing; recall the days when we stopped having "in person" worship and no one could visit in hospitals and nursing homes. Those were the hardest days for me as your pastor.

Now that we have for the most part re-entered into a more regular pattern of social interaction, I still am concerned for those who are suffering the long-term impacts of isolation. God created us to be social beings, so, as I mentioned in one of my 40 Gleanings, "if you are one who is battling loneliness please do everything within your power to reach out, and if you are one who knows someone who is battling loneliness please do everything within your power to reach in."

There is also a spiritual aspect to isolation. We were not designed or intended to do this life of faith alone, but in community with others. While we are tremendously grateful for the technology of "live streaming" our worship services and classes, something vital is missing when that becomes our only diet. We were made, socially and spiritually, to be in relationship, with God and others. So, if you have not yet returned to in-person worship, or classes or fellowship, and you do not have a good reason for doing so other than you are out of the habit, I encourage you to do a gut check on your own spiritual vitality, get off the spiritual island of isolation and come on back home.

Loneliness and isolation is a terrible disease, for that reason, God has designed us to be together.

I look forward to being in worship with you soon.

Back to School Celebration

On Sunday afternoon, July 24th, Tab hosted our second annual Back-To-School celebration. It was an opportunity to grow our faith through service to others, to deepen relationships, and to come alongside others to help strengthen the Mapleton-Fall Creek community.

With the perfect amount of cloud cover to provide shade all day, nearly 40 Tab volunteers (adult, children and youth) and about the same number of community partners offered backpacks, school supplies, snacks, goodies, music and games to approximately 175 students and their families. In addition, we provided backpack and supplies to another 17 student participants in a sports camp at Tab and 14 more through our friends in Circles.

Each student was able to pick their preferred backpack color and choose the specific supplies they needed for the school year. Providing a choice and allowing them to express their own needs and desires is not only respectful to the student, it can be a confidence booster as they start the school year. In total, we distributed 206 Tab-sponsored backpacks and thousands of school supplies, donated by members of Tab and Phillips Temple churches, and employees of Employ-Indy (who held a friendly office competition that resulted in a donation of 800 items).

This event is truly a vision of what a beloved community of compassion, collaboration, welcome and joy looks like. It would not have been possible without the generous hearts and faithful prayers of many folks. With deepest gratitude, we are thankful for the members of Tab who donated supplies, the twenty adults who helped distribute supplies and interact with families, and the Tab youth who helped set up the event, staffed supply tables, played games with students and made sure everyone had plenty of snacks.

We are also appreciative of the community friends and partners whose presence contributed to the success of the event: Freewheeling Bikes, Raphael Health Center, Employ-Indy, Indianapolis Children's Museum, Indianapolis Public Library Info Zone, The Lawnmower Project, Circles Indy, Mapleton-Fall Creek Neighborhood Association, Bradley and Company, Resources in the Park, KIPP Indy Elementary and Phalen Leadeship Academy (#48). Lastly, a huge shout-out to the spirited DJs who, under the leadership of Rick Sayles, donated their time and energy to keep us smiling and dancing all afternoon!

Most importantly, we are grateful for the opportunity to be a light in the community and for the many neighbors who took time on a Sunday afternoon to celebrate with us. We look forward to continuing this tradition in 2023. May God's blessing and protection be on all the students, their families and those charged with educating them this school year.


Register for the Tab Golf Classic

A Look Back

"The Decision to Stay"

After a decade of growth and a time of healthy congregational development, the 1960s loomed as a time of enormous change and disruption for Tab. An Indianapolis Star editorial in 1947 had written positively of the congregations of Meridian Street Methodist and St. Paul's Episcopal leaving their downtown church buildings, and making plans for new locations along Meridian Street, two to three miles north of Tab, stating that "both churches are following their members and population growth." Notably, Second Presbyterian and First Baptist also left downtown and moved even further north, in 1959 and 1960, respectively. Tab's leadership saw these trends as well, and in October 1957, called out the "necessity for a study and re-evaluation of the entire church program in the light of the changing needs of the church congregation and surrounding community before any new permanent staff appointments are made." There was much anxiety.

The Civil Rights movement in the 1950s and early 1960s resulted in enormous change in America, which was long overdue. Practices of restricting housing opportunities for minorities began to lift and many Black families began to

move to the near northside of Indianapolis. As mentioned last month, Tab's parking lot was not built until 1954; its need was mitigated by the fact that a large percentage of attendees still walked to church. But then people began to move north. In the era of "white flight" entire blocks would go up for sale in a matter of months. An example of the rapid pace of the change is that my kindergarten class photo at School 66, in 1960, featured all white children; by the time my class graduated in 1969, it consisted of 90% Black students. In 1960, 2% of the residents of the Mapleton-Fall Creek neighborhood were Black; by 1983, 87% of the residents were Black. Most of the neighborhoods in Washington and Lawrence Townships were developed in the 1960s, in response to this "white flight" movement.

In the midst of these drastic changes, Tab's leadership was faced with the question of how to respond. In December 1963, Session passed a motion relative to Tab Recreation, "It is moved that this Session declare (Tab Rec) to be a non-segregated program." While small numbers of Black children had played at Tab in the 1920s and 1930s, sometime afterwards a policy of segregation had taken hold. Despite this bold – for its time – and controversial motion (the vote was 11-8!), my own Tab softball team, in 1964, remained all-white, no doubt the result of a new policy – purportedly to manage the number of participants – which gave priority to Tab families and families already registered in the program, somewhat nullifying the non-segregation policy. Change was difficult and heels dug in.

It wasn't just Tab Rec that was struggling to desegregate. At that same 1963 session meeting, by a vote of 14-7, a motion was passed to open up church membership to "all people, regardless of racial or ethnic origin," and that the only requirement for membership "shall continue to be confession of Jesus Christ as one's Lord and Savior, and indication of a genuine desire to unite with our fellowship actively, to support its work, witness and worship, and to promote its peace and unity." Well put, but shocking that it was in dispute.

Ultimately, Tab's new pastor, 38-year-old James Payson Martin, called for the formation of a special task force – the 12-member Metropolitan Community Program Committee – to study the question of whether Tab should leave its 34th and Central campus and move north. Issued in January 1966, its conclusion was clear, that Tab should remain at its current location. Its summary is worth noting. "With full CONTINUED on back cover

recognition of the changes of the neighborhood, increasing racial tension and violence, the migration of our members as well as many other churches and businesses to the suburbs, the increase in average age of our members and the decline in the levels of participation, we made the counter-cultural, counter-intuitive decision to stay in order to be a 'force for Christ in the heart of the City."

A number of things happened after this. Tab began to brand itself as The Metropolitan Church of Indianapolis, aiming to draw members from not just its own neighborhood, but from all over the city. Dr. Martin called for a \$350,000 capital-funds campaign, with the clever slogan of Turn Tab Around. In 1968, a new glass store-front entrance at what was formerly Tab's back door, at the parking lot, became Tab's new front door, complete with an elevator, a remodeled office block and pastor's office, and air conditioning of the dining room and the sanctuary. It was a strong statement to say "We're investing to stay!" The slogan also hinted at the need for the congregation to embrace its new role as a church in the middle of a chang-



ing neighborhood with many needs - a new mission field for future community ministries. Tab had a new identity, and not everyone agreed with it. Perhaps up to one-third of its active members departed to other churches. And on my Tab softball team, in 1966, I was one of two white players. Tab was turning around and a new chapter had begun.
