# Pastoral Reflection

## Summer Fun

Dear Friends,

With football season now upon us I was reminded of this story which I found fascinating.

While the US version of the game was invented in 1869, and the first intercollegiate game was played between Princeton and Rutgers that November, the forward pass was not introduced until 1906. The concept of throwing the ball rather than running it was slow to “catch on.” Most teams learned some basic passing plays in case they had to use them at the end of a game in a desperate situation, but St. Louis University adopted it immediately, and they did so quite successfully. In the 1906 season they outscored their opponents 402 to 11.

What did St. Louis University do that other college teams did not? Bucking the tradition of the way the game had always been played, they saw the future and embraced it.

We at Tab, and I believe the Church in general, are standing on the brink of a new day. Coming off of the pandemic I am not convinced that the past is a good indicator of the future, so I believe we will continue to have to explore new ways of doing what we have always done to live and serve as God’s people.

As Tab celebrates our 100th year at the corner of 34th and Central, and our 171st in the city, we will need to continually explore new ways to carry out our ministries and reach out to our neighbors with the love of Jesus Christ.

Our stewardship program for 2023 is appropriately themed “Preparing Expectantly.” This phrase is lifted from our Tab Mission statement which reminds us to “celebrate our past...live faithfully in the present... and prepare expectantly for the future.” In the coming weeks you will be receiving information about the 2023 stewardship program and our plans for the coming year. I hope you will carefully read and faithfully pray about the ways you will support Tab in the coming year with your prayers, your involvement and the pledging of your financial support.

Times of change can often cause concern and anxiety, but that is not necessary for us at Tab. We are a faithful congregation and we serve a faithful God. As we “prepare expectantly for the future” we can see this season of change in the way the game is played as one of great opportunity!

# Missions in the Neighborhood

## Open Door

Just over four months ago, the Open Door feeding ministry was re-launched with a new name, the Open Door Ministry Café, and a new vision: Feeding bodies and souls by providing a safe place with good food and even better conversation for the sake authentic relationship building that fosters Greater Faith, Deeper Relationships and Stronger Communities.

The planning team envisioned a community knitted of staff, volunteers and neighbors, long-timers and new-comers, sharing in hope, creating connection and experiencing belonging. This new model meant changes to nearly every aspect of the existing ministry—from the type of food served, to the way neighbors are greeted and served, to the role of the volunteers moving forward.

Needless to say, the start-up of the new model was not without its share of kinks and questions: How would the neighbors respond to the radical changes? How could such a small volunteer crew make this big dream work? There were also new food-safety and serving processes to learn, as well as tough decisions about ministry priorities to discern.

Still, despite the unknowns, the willingness of the volunteers to be vulnerable and to trust that the guiding vision for the Café was right, achievable and consistent with God's mission, has carried the ministry to a new level of blessing, impact, and success.

Some aspects of success are easily quantified—number of people served, number of volunteers, or gallons of mashed potatoes and pans of fried chicken! It is a bit more chal-

lenging, however, to measure progress toward the relationship-building goal. Rather than gathering facts and figures, the evidence of successful relational ministry is found in the stories of emerging trust, connection and relationships being formed at the Café. Stories of:

- “Regulars” who meet at the same table every day to connect and who notice when someone is missing.
- Group home residents who get a “restaurant” experience in a safe, welcoming place where they are greeted by name.
- Volunteers from Tab, the neighborhood and community partners who are becoming friends, checking on and praying for each other regularly, covering shifts as needed
- Generous anonymous donations in the Café’s freewill offering box. We have received over \$878 since opening in May—mostly in loose change and dollar bills.
- Trust exhibited by neighbors who have submitted more than 40 unique prayer requests, and the faithfulness of the Tab folks who have lifted up them to God.
- Joyful banter and caring conversations shared among neighbors and volunteers who know each other by name!

Undoubtedly, the relationships are real and the stories are plentiful. Watch for more Open Door Ministry Café stories in future issues of Chimes and reach out to Pastor Terri Thorn if you would like to learn more about creating one of your own.

# A Look Back

## “A Period of Renewal—1970s and 1980s”

The courageous decision to remain at 34th and Central was now a part of Tab’s identity and fabric, but it didn’t mean that Tab was well-equipped for the new challenges that lay ahead. A healthy chunk of the congregation opted for a new church home, mostly on the rapidly expanding northside. Dr. James Payson Martin worked diligently to help develop new community ministries. He worked with the pastors of Our Redeemer Lutheran and North United Methodist, Tab’s neighboring churches, to form the Tri-Church Council—later the Mid-North Church Council—in an effort to work together in our “new” mission field. But Tab still struggled to find its footing.

Then in 1971, under Dr. Martin’s leadership, the high school youth group experienced its spiritual revival, affecting the entire congregation—including Dr. Martin—in a powerful way, and Tab took on a more evangelical nature. “Doc” Martin left in 1974, one week after hiring Bob Hunter as a new assistant pastor.

Dr. Byron Crozier, coming from a successful pastorate in Indiana, Pennsylvania, succeeded Dr. Martin the following year. One of nine children—five of whom went into full-time ministry—Byron earned two Purple Hearts in WWII and was rescued by a PT skipper named John F. Kennedy when Byron’s ship floundered after hitting a coral reef. He met and married Beth Watson while at Wheaton College, where they befriended another couple, Jim and Elisabeth Elliott. A fine athlete, Byron was invited to the US Olympic Trials in the high hurdles in 1948, and his brother married the sister of a man named Fred Rogers (yes, that Mr. Rogers).

Quiet and conservative—he and Beth always insisted on voting, if only to cancel each other’s vote—Byron quickly established a bent towards ministry and action, both local and international. With his associates, Bob Hunter and John Person, who served together from 1978 to 1989, Byron ushered in an era of stability and growth. Among the many ministries and programs that began during this period were the following: Lay parish visitors, covenant groups, the soup kitchen, the food pantry, tutoring programs, Stephen Ministry, Seder Supper, Thanksgiving Day dinners, Kerygma, Right Friends, Christmas Poinsettias and Easter Lilies, and annual recognition of 50-year members. Forward-looking tech-savvy members began the fledgling media ministry in the late 70s and the daily radio program, Good News from Tab, began in 1981. Tab worked closely with the Billy Graham Crusade and Chuck Colson’s Prison Fellowship. A close relationship and occasional pulpit exchange developed with African Enterprise and Bishop Festo Kivengere, as well as the Rev.



Charles Gordon in Durban, South Africa, which resulted in the young Rod Smith coming to Tab.

The church nurseries were virtually empty when the population of young couples—known as Koinonia Couples—grew from a handful of newlyweds in 1979 to a roster of 60 or more couples by 1990, and with them came children. Lots of children. They populated a highly successful Christian Ed children’s program lead by Jeannie Byers, who introduced the Advent Workshop and the popular Travel Units, as well as Vacation Bible School which brought in many kids from the neighborhood. The influx of new members led to the introduction of the many well-attended TabFest retreats at Clifty Falls State Park.

A growing congregation demanded facility improvements, as well. Two capital campaigns, in 1985 and 1990 (known as Our Level Best), resulted in a refurbishment of the lower-level assembly rooms, to be known as Lower Levels A and B,

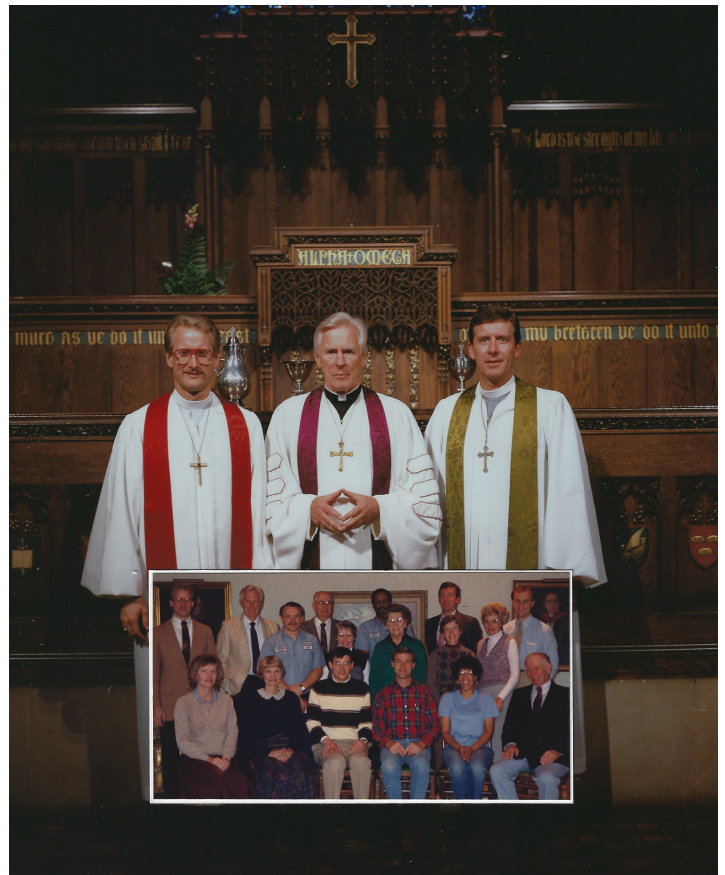


to facilitate the burgeoning Christian Ed children's programs. The Gallery, with long-needed restrooms followed, with a smoother transition made between the Gallery and the dining room—who remembers that narrow and circuitous path into the dining room past the stairway and through the coat room?

Byron and the session adopted six guiding principles during this time, to inform Tab's mission and focus. These remain as true and meaningful today as they were then:

- Jesus is Lord
- The Importance of Scripture
- A Rule to Live By
- Involvement with Suffering People
- A Simple Lifestyle, and
- Celebration Through the Arts

In 25 years, from the mid-60s decision to make a statement and to stay, to the close of the 1980s, Tab had grown in multiple ways and remade itself into a solid evangelical beacon of hope for the neighborhood at hand and for the City of Indianapolis. The next decade would offer more reasons for hope and encouragement, but not without many difficulties and challenges.
