Pastoral Reflection

Summer Fun

Dear Friends,

Ever since I was in seminary, now 40 years ago, I have kept a card file of quotes and sayings and stories that I want to remember, save and use. So, in a sense, every sermon I preach or lesson I teach is the compilation of four decades worth of thinking and reading.

This week I came across a quote in the “stewardship” section of my card files which I wholly agree with, but somehow failed to note who wrote it, which makes me think perhaps I did, which perhaps is the reason I agree with it.

“When we give to the church and other Christian ministries, I believe we are doing something fundamentally different than when we give to other charities and causes. When we give to the church we are making a statement that we believe God is at work in the world and that He has called the church to participate in that work. When we give to the church we are making the statement that we want to be a part of what God is doing in the world.”

In his second letter to the Corinthians, Paul writes, “You will be enriched in every way for your great generosity which will produce thanksgiving to God through us; for the rendering of this ministry not only supplies the needs of the saints but also overflows with many thanksgivings to God.” (II Cor. 9:11-12)

What Paul is saying is, when we give to the church and to Christian causes there is a double blessing: not only are human needs being met through their work and ministries, but also God is being honored and glorified; hence the double blessing. That being said, if you are not giving to the church or to other Christian causes, I certainly hope you are giving to some cause which helps to meet human need. We who have been blessed are called to be a blessing.

Perhaps Henri Nouwen said it best when he writes, “Asking people for money is giving them the opportunity to put their resources at the disposal of the Kingdom of God.” I absolutely believe that and I cannot tell you the number of times I have seen the joy it brings to the giver when they experience being part of what God is doing in the world through their giving.

If you do not receive one, additional packets are available at church or please contact Kristine Green, our Director of Finance. Member Spotlight

Meet Mike & Jill O'Banyel

Every year at Tab, we host the Mozel Sanders Annual Thanksgiving Dinner. This tradition of service dates back to the 1970s when Tab member Ted O'Banyel began leading volunteers in establishing Tab as a satellite location for these annual community meals. Today, Mike, Jill and Sean O'Banyel continue this legacy of leadership as we begin planning for the 2022 dinner.

The O'Banyel history at Tab dates back a couple of generations. Mike's maternal grandparents, Earl and Hazel Harris, joined Tab in June of 1921. Mike's mother, Eileen, was baptized here and grew up attending Tab. Eileen met her husband, Ted O'Banyel, when Ted was serving in the Army Air Corps. They married and moved out-of-state before returning to Indianapolis and to Tab a few years later. Here they welcomed the births of Mike and his sister Pat.

Mike was active in Tab's youth group, and he was a part of the Tab Caravan mission trips to Oklahoma from 1971 through 1973. This period was instrumental in leading him to a deeper faith in Christ. Mike also remembers fondly his early instruction in faith by his third grade Sunday school teacher, Mary Ellen May.

Mike graduated from Arlington High School and then attended Purdue University. A first marriage brought the birth of his sons Kevin and Ryan, as well as a move to the Detroit area. While the boys were young, Mike and his family returned to Indianapolis where he ran the print shop at Tab.

A lifelong Indianapolis resident, Jill graduated from Pike High School. She graduated from Marian College with degrees in English and Fine Arts. She then went to work at State Life Insurance Company as a graphic artist. Jill began attending Tab in the early 1980s. She and Mike met following the end of his first marriage. They married in 1985 and welcomed two more sons, Sean and Colin, over the next few years.

Following his work in the print shop, Mike worked for Tab member Don Fledderjohn at Master Glass and Color. He then moved into the insurance business for 20+ years, including working with his father for many years at O'Banyel Insurance. Meanwhile, Mike completed a degree in elementary education and taught for several years. Currently, Mike works for Rectify Solar.

Jill worked as a stay-at-home mother while the boys were all young. She then spent many years in education while working for different IPS schools in varying roles. She currently works as a teaching assistant in IPS for a Montessori school.

Mike and Jill have served at Tab in countless ways throughout the years. Both volunteered in Tab Rec for many years while their sons participated in sports. Both sing in Tab's Sanctuary Choir. Mike is also a section leader for the choir and also plays in the Handbell Choir. Mike served as an elder with multiple committees, including missions and facilities. He and Dan Hursh rechartered Boy Scout Troop 72 here at Tab in 1998.

Jill served as a deacon, including as the moderator. She's also active in the Purls of Wisdom ministry and has volunteered with multiple committees. Children's ministries commissioned her to make the quilted rainbow mural that is in LLA (now in the "Twos" nursery). It was installed in 1993. Jill serves as the "design expert" when volunteers decorate the Sanctuary with flowers for Easter and Christmas.

Mike and Jill both agree that Tab is "home" to them. The family connections, friendships and history here are deeply meaningful for the O'Banyel family.

A Look Back

“Christ and the City of Indianapolis”

In September 1991, after a one-year interim period which followed Byron Crozier's retirement, Dr. Frank Kik, recently of Topeka, Kansas, began a brief but substantive ministry at Tab. Frank brought a strong business acumen to Tab and performed well as both head of staff and senior pastor. A strong preacher, Frank played a role whereby Tab's reach began to extend well beyond what had been imagined.

That winter of 1991–92, a small Sunday School class began contemplating what more could be done in the community, to grow Tab's ministries to the needy who lived within sight of Tab's lofty tower, and to address real-life issues and problems. Populated by some in the medical field, the group identified the fundamental need of medical care and brainstormed means by which a neighborhood health clinic could be established. It was to be a place where our neighbors, who might not have the means to seek out care in the large hospitals, could walk in and freely receive the care that was so desperately needed. But how does one go about creating something like this from scratch?

God had planted the seed, however, and circumstances began to come together where plans were developed. Literally across the street, at the southeast corner of 34th and New Jersey, sat the one-story dental office of Dr. Rusk, who had served there many years and decided to retire. With no succession plan in place, the good doctor closed up his practice and put his property up for sale. The small group with big plans saw a great opportunity and worked closely with Dr. Kik to consider the possibilities.

On a sunny Palm Sunday morning, April 12, 1992, Frank delivered arguably the most impactful sermon ever delivered from the Tab pulpit. He titled it “Christ and the City of Indianapolis,” and based it on a passage from Luke 19. “As he approached Jerusalem and saw the city, he wept over it, and said, ‘If you, even you, had only known on this day what would bring you peace—but now it is hidden from your eyes.’” He spelled out the great difficulties of life in the city, of the challenges before its residents, even the residents of Indianapolis. Frank laid down a vision for the congregation. “Let Indianapolis be a city where the affluent help the poor and the poor love the great. A city where love and charity and peace rule supreme, as they will do in the city whose builder and maker is God.”

Frank went on to state, “I believe you who were here at Tabernacle Church 27 or so years ago made the right decision to stay in the inner-city and minister with this community.



You are a people of courage and conviction. You are rare in Christendom. Do you know that? Most have fled to the suburbs. I salute you and I am proud of you. Today, however, I look at what is before us and I am anxious that we now take a major step into the future. Therefore, I would be so bold this morning to suggest a new vision to mobilize ourselves for Jesus Christ. It is going to be costly. Do you have the faith? Do you have the faith to move now or do you want to sit around for a few more years?"

The challenge was made to purchase the former dentist's office and to establish a neighborhood health clinic, as well as a lengthy list of other outreach opportunities—many of which did come to fruition—such as a free legal service, a tax prep clinic, counseling center, a latchkey ministry, a clothing closet, and on and on. Days later a single donor brought a check for \$100,000 to purchase the property, and the rest, as they say, is history.

Some early versions of what we now know as the Raphael Health Center, brought invaluable experience, and by the spring of 1996, Raphael was fully open with its own part-time medical director. Today, with its own board of directors, a full staff, and two expansions later, Raphael is an astonishing example of what can happen when a handful of people choose to dream big dreams, aided by a pastor who recognized the need to cast a vision for a congregation that occasionally needed to be reminded of its unique role in this City.

As Frank wrapped up his sermon that morning 30 years ago, he clearly stated that “We are not another secular social agency. We are the body of Christ. The day we fail to present Jesus Christ as the personal Savior of our soul and the souls of our neighbors is the day we cease to be the church of Jesus Christ....Thanks be to God for this challenge.” Even today, that challenge remains and the opportunities continue to present themselves.

WORSHIP SCHEDULE SURVEY

The response to the Sunday morning worship schedule was outstanding! We received over 220 responses which is nearly equal to our Sunday morning "in person" worship attendance. The findings were helpful in our decision making as to what our schedule should be. Here are the results:

- Approximately 80% of those who responded are currently 10a worshipers.
- Approximately 80% of all who responded indicated that they liked the current schedule "a lot" or it was "OK."
- With regard to music style preference, approximately 2/3 said they favored traditional and 1/3 contemporary/Gospel/Jazz.
- 78% of respondents indicated that their music style preference is either "essential" or "has an impact" on their worship experience.
- 60% responded that we should keep the current schedule and 37% suggested that we return to the former three service schedule.
- The predominant theme in the "comments" section was general satisfaction with the current schedule and an overwhelming appreciation and enjoyment of having the congregation "together in worship."

Of course, surveys can be interpreted many different ways. Having studied the survey the Session voted to remain with the current 8a and 10a Worship schedule. Conversations have already begun with the contemporary worship leadership team with suggestions as to how to introduce elements which will better serve those whose preference is "contemporary" while still meeting the preferences of our "traditional" worshipers. Other ideas and suggestions will continue to be welcomed and considered.

Thanks to each of you who took the time to complete the survey and share your thoughts as to our worship life together.

Mission Spotlight

Diversity and Justice Team promotes awareness

Last February, when Tab produced a series of stories about Black pioneers in healthcare, the congregation showed such an appreciation for the articles that the team expanded its focus to produce articles about the achievements of Black Hoosiers in other fields. Once again met with enthusiasm, the team—now dubbed the Diversity and Justice Team—is broadening its focus activities even more.

The half-dozen collaborators—Julie Howard, Doug Moeller, Nickey and Carolyn Morris, Terri Thorn and John Thomas—are planning an ongoing program of articles, learning opportunities and other activities to help the congregation increase its awareness of diverse communities, beyond simply racial diversity, within the community of Christ.

Driving this effort is the team members' increasing awareness of the diverse stories and opportunities surrounding us. "After watching the documentary about Crispus Attucks High School during Black History month at Tab, I realized how much more there is to learn about the community immediately around us," Doug Moeller said. "This impression was reinforced by the Mapleton-Fall Creek walking tour hosted by Trinity Church. I want to learn more about the Tab neighborhood."

"It was only once I had significant relationships with people who had not grown up in the same environment as myself did I realize the infinite number of experiences and perspectives in our country," added Julie Howard. "I am called by Jesus Christ to bring this same awareness to others so that Christ's message of reconciliation of ALL peoples, places, and things can occur."

To ensure that this kind of individual inspiration is rooted in Scripture, the Diversity and Justice Team has identified two Bible passages to guide its work.

Ephesians 2:14 will ensure that the work follows in Christ's example, as Paul described it when he explained that Gentiles and Jews would no longer be separated: "For He Himself is our peace, who has made the two groups one and has destroyed the barrier, the dividing wall of hostility."



And Colossians 3:23-24 will ensure that the team works to serve Christ: "Whatever you do, work at it with all your heart, as working for the Lord, not for human masters, since you know that you will receive an inheritance from the Lord as a reward. It is the Lord Christ you are serving."

In coming months, the team's work will continue and grow, as it plans to augment its series of articles with other activities that will allow Tab members to learn more about the diversity in the community, provide a forum for diverse voices and perspectives and continue to broaden the congregation's opportunities to be welcoming to people from various backgrounds.

"Tab has an exciting history of seeking racial equity, but we cannot rest on the laurels of the past," said John Thomas. "We must follow Christ's example, seeking deeper understanding of all people, especially those who are not like us."

Continue to watch for the stories from the Diversity and Justice Team in various Tab media, and also watch for a dedicated webpage on the Tab website.
