

A Visit to Kenya

A Letter from John Gable

"It takes a village to raise a child," has become a catch phrase in American culture; it is a daily reality in Kenya.

I am just returning from a twelve day journey to Western Kenya visiting the Umoja partnership. You will recall, Umoja is a ministry which Tab has supported for many years, serving orphaned and vulnerable children, and it is the ministry I asked you to support with gifts honoring my retirement which you did in an extraordinary way. Thank you so much!

My experience was both humbling and inspiring. Each day I met with children, teachers, guardians, pastors, and the Umoja staff and got a keen insight in to the needs of the children we serve. One of the phrases I heard repeatedly was "hungry children cannot learn," which reminded me of the time Jesus fed the 5000 when he saw that they were too hungry to listen to his teaching. One day, while visiting a very remote school, we walked with 11 year old Brian to his home, which was a difficult 45 minute walk from the school. Sitting in his simple, mud hut home, we visited with him and his mother. They had not eaten breakfast that day, nor would they eat dinner; only the meal we would serve Brian and his classmates at lunch. Brian's story is not unique. It is the oft repeated story of the over 5000 students Umoja serves each day while at school. The meal we serve them of about a cup and a half of maize and beans is sufficient to allow the poorest and lowest scoring children in the class to rise to the top. Besides a meal we also provide school uniforms, feminine napkins, solar lamps, blankets, girls and boys empowerment programs, as well as scholarships for those who are



able to continue their education all the way through university. All of which is again, both humbling and inspiring.

One of the primary reasons I returned to Kenya is because your gift to me allowed Umoja to adopt a 21st school and I was able to be there for the inaugural celebration and meal. Eluhobe Consolidated School is one of poorest in the region. The day began with a meeting with the lead teacher who welcomed us in prayer before introducing us to the other teachers, followed by a tree planting ceremony marking the occasion. Then began a three-hour long celebration including a prayer and sermon by a local pastor, speeches by government officials, local educators, guardians and parents, singing, dancing and presentations by each of the classes, all attended by hundreds of children. This then was followed by our serving the inaugural meal to those hungry children. The energy and excitement was palpable, humbling and inspiring.

Not only did I get to experience the ministry of Umoja in a practical, hands-on way, I also found it inspiring to me spiritually. Every day, in every visit, we were prayed for by our Kenyan friends: by lead teachers welcoming us to their schools, by parents and guardians welcoming us to their homes, by Umoja leaders before each meeting and meal, and even by students when called upon to pray. I cannot tell you the number of times I heard the call and response: "God is good....all the time; All the time...God is good for that is his nature." Umoja is a ministry faithfully serving a faithful and grateful people.

When asked, "When did we see you hungry?" Jesus answered, "As you did it to one of the least you did it unto me." I am so grateful that I got to see how Umoja is doing this work of Jesus and I am grateful to the Tab family for honoring my ministry in this life-changing way. I am both humble and inspired.

Meet Mike & Pat Cracraft!

Three words that resonate through the Bible—"water" "fishing" and "the law" are those that describe Pat and Mike Cracraft. An avid fly-fisherman, Mike was born in Indianapolis into a family of lawyers; his brother, sister and father, all lawyers. Mike was a "Tab off-spring" i.e. he lived round the corner from Tab, played at Tab Recreation; and studied at Shortridge, North Central, landing at Miami University of Ohio. It was there he "hooked" the beautiful Pat, who was born in Georgetown and grew up in Arlington, VA.

They married in 1967 and Mike enlisted in the National Guard. Two children followed: son Jim in 1968 and daughter Megan, in 1971. With a young family to support, he attended Indiana University Law School at night, while working as the youngest ever Executive Director of the State Scholarship Commission. At their first home at Cold Springs Manor, they reconnected with Jim Babcock (his Cub Scouts' partner in crime, from when they were in shorts!). Jim shepherded them back to Tab from their then spiritual home at St. Andrews Presbyterian Church. At Tab, they were immediately welcomed into The Mariners, a group of young families—Babcocks, Harveys, Fledderjohns, Simonels and Gilroys—for the next 15 years. Mike's responsibilities have included Elder and Deacon. Pat was a Deacon and taught Sunday School for more than 25 years. A passionate photographer, Mike took Tab Recreation team pictures, as well as new member photos for many years.

Behind every successful man is a woman—that was Pat who kept the home fires burning as Mike became a litigation attorney for various utilities. After 50 years in law, Mike recently retired in 2023. Jim, their son, now teaches at Vanderbilt, while Megan, with a Masters in Anthropology, used her talents at the American Museum of Natural History in NYC. Both have two lovely daughters.

Fly-fishing (Mike), kayaking and traveling are their pursuits now. Mike ties his own "flys," a true art. They have traveled to Greece and Israel (Tab trips), Brazil, Venezuela, Chile, Patagonia (for Brown Trout in the Rio Grande!) and Mexico. Mike attends the Saturday Men's Bible Study, when he's not walking in the sand at Vero Beach, their holiday get-away in Florida.

Mike's love for Christ was rekindled at Tab in 1973 by Fellowship of Christian Athletes member Bobby Richardson, who spoke of Christ's sovereignty in his life. They attribute their growth in Christ to pastors (Martin, Crozier, Hunter

Tab Recreation: 1950s Boom

100 Years of Outstretched Arms Into the Community



This article, and others to come throughout the year, will take apeek by decades at what was going on in the nation; in entertainment; in the world of sports; and highlights about "Tab's outstretched arm into the community" as former pastor, James Martin, was fond of referring to Tab Recreation.

The 1950's brought us innovations in science and medicine: the first successful human organ transplant; an effective vaccine for polio; and the first correct model of the double helix of DNA. U.S. servicemen once again headed off to war, this time in Korea. The space age dawned with the launch of Sputnik 1 by the Soviet Union. A young Elizabeth II was crowned Queen of England. The United States and the Soviet Union faced off with the birth of the Cold War. The U.S. economy boomed, as did the birth rate for babies. Families started moving to suburbs. Here in Indianapolis the pace remained familiarly slower. The Robert's Dairy man made home deliveries from his route truck and the Omar Man brought fresh bread to your door.

In entertainment, families gathered around the TV set in their living rooms to watch "I Love Lucy." CBS broadcast the first color TV program, but unfortunately, almost no one had a color set, so it went unnoticed. The Catcher in the Rye was published. Disneyland opened in Anaheim, California. Elvis Presley appeared on the Ed Sullivan Show. The Sound of Music opened on Broadway, and Clark Gable starred in the movie "To Please a Lady," filmed at the Indianapolis Motor Speedway.

In sports, Ben Hogan won the 1951 U.S. Open. Floyd Patterson won the New York State Golden Gloves Championship as a middleweight and in the same year he earned a gold medal at the Helsinki Olympics. Roger Bannister broke the 4-minute mile record. Crispus Attucks won the Indiana State Basketball Tournament. Bill Vukovitch died in a crash during an Indianapolis 500 mile race, and Jackie Robinson retired from the Brooklyn Dodgers.

Tab Recreation had five short-term directors between 1947 and 1951. But in 1951, Tab selected Russ Earl, a young man with a heavy Boston accent to be the next director. Russ guided the program through 34 years of growth and change. The experiment of opening the program to community boys, and shortly thereafter to girls, was key to rapid growth during the 1950's. Kids played basketball, baseball, softball, and football at Tab. The kids were almost exclusively white, protestant and upper-middle class, but as the decade drew to a close, a migration of families away from Tab's neighborhoods to new suburbs on the north side was underway. The 1950's were good years at Tab recreation.

ORGAN UP-DATE

Progress continues to be made on our organ project. The new blower racks have been built and installed behind the stage in the Dining Room, the west wall of the back balcony has been opened up for the new organ chamber, new electrical has been run to accommodate additional needs in the back balcony for the new console, air reservoirs (pressure regulators for the pipes) are under construction at Goulding and Wood Organ Builders and pipework is being fabricated and restored at Casavant Fréres in Quebec. SERMON SERIES: LENT: A MIRROR OF OUR ANXIETY

Lent is a time when Christians traditionally join with Jesus on pilgrimage; going with him on his way to Jerusalem and all that awaits him there. One of the realities of his journey is that it made everyone around him very anxious. Jesus' constant talk about dying greatly unsettled his supporters. His constant talk about God overthrowing and revamping the way Judaism was practiced, greatly unsettled the Jewish religious leaders. Speaking such unsettling truths also proved to be stressful and anxiety producing for Jesus himself.

As we all have learned in recent years, a pandemic produces a lot of lingering anxiety. Ever-present uncertainty, potential medical challenges, political upheaval, the threat of death — all these things increase our individual and corporate anxiety. Interim time also offers an additional layer of anxiety to the friends/members of Tab this Lent. A new and unfamiliar cog in the leadership team means expectations must be adapted or even changed.

As we seek to address our anxiety, the Lenten journey seems an unlikely resource. And yet following Jesus and observing the waves of anxiety that swirl around him, provides us both the opportunity to better understand what makes us anxious, and invites us to practice emotional skill-building designed to lessen our anxiety. Such resources encourage growth toward our being the emotionally healthy and faithfully vibrant disciples and congregation we all want to be.

Because the Gospel message always proclaims hope, we are able to celebrate that God does not abandon us to our anxiety. God instead promises to always be with us. Easter resurrection invites us beyond Lenten anxiety to God's new possibilities. Yet, Lent reminds us, that there is no straight line between anxiety and Resurrection. Instead, there is always a journey toward new learning and personal growth. A journey in which we are invited to embrace new ways of living and acting and loving and believing – all to the glory of God!
