

Meet The DeTrudes

The word "shepherd" means to protect, guide and lead. The DeTrudes exude that warmth in every aspect of their lives—with their daughters, with clients at work and with colleagues at Tab.

Tab Recreation

1960s Radical Years

This article, and others to come throughout the year, will take a peek by decades at what was going on in the nation; in entertainment; in the world of sports; and highlights about "Tab's outstretched arm into the community" as former pastor James Martin was fond of referring to Tab Recreation.

The decade of the 60's started out full of hope, a Golden Age, led in the U.S. by a handsome, popular, young President John F. Kennedy. It soon became a decade full of revolution, an era of protest and sweeping change. Soviet cosmonaut Yuri Gagarin became the first man in space. By the end of the decade, Buzz Aldrin and Neil Armstrong took the first steps by man on the surface of the moon.

We witnessed the assassinations of John and Robert Kennedy, Malcom X and Martin Luther King. We saw the New Frontier and the Great Society. The civil rights movement began, as did the gay rights movement and the sexual revolution. A counterculture emerged, marked by disrespect for traditional ways. The Cold War raged on. The Berlin Wall was built. An ugly and unpopular Vietnam War claimed 58,000 American lives. For many, it seemed as if we were a nation falling apart.








In entertainment, television, which had found a place in nearly every American home during the '50's, burst fully onto the scene in the '60's. Doctor Kildare took us into the hospital, The Beverly Hillbillies took us from the hills to Hollywood, and Laugh-In taught us "Here come da judge." We listened to Bob Dylan, Joan Baez and Peter Paul and Mary; The Beatles, Janis Joplin and Jimi Hendrix; Diana Ross, Smokey Robinson and Stevie Wonder. We went to the movie theater to see The Graduate, Easy Rider and Bonnie and Clyde. Entertainment took on a harder edge, reflecting the cultural revolution of the time. A movie rating system was devised because of increased nudity, graphic language and violence on the screen. The musical Hair closed out an entertainment decade that was vastly changed from when it began.

In 1967 the Packers defeated the Chiefs 37-10 in the first Super Bowl game. Casius Clay, (aka the Louisville Lip), dominated boxing; the NY Yankees dominated baseball; UCLA, coached by John Wooden, dominated basketball. We saw Roger Maris top Babe Ruth's single-season home record; Jack Nicklaus win the first of his six Masters titles; and Peggy Fleming win gold in figure skating at the Winter Olympics in Grenoble, France.







Across the country as the decade progressed, changing racial segregation and discrimination issues were met with resistance and often conflict. At Tab recreation, the gates swung open. Black and white kids played together on teams coached by both black and white coaches. Around the fence, in the stands and in the balcony, parents cheered for their kids and their teams just the same, regardless of their color. Tab recreation was an integration leader in the city.

Along with tackle football, boys' and girls' softball, and boys' and girls' basketball, Tab's recreation director, Russ Earl introduced archery and track and field day. Tab Recreation weathered a tumultuous decade with growth and progress.

ORGAN UP-DATE

Here's the latest on our Sanctuary organ renovation!

The pipe chambers are now complete. The new chamber has been prepared on the west side and the existing chamber on the east side has been completely renovated! The steel supports are finished and now work will begin on the balcony floor refinishing. When the floors are finished, Goulding & Wood will begin their work and placing the pipe chests and blowers for the back organ sometime mid-July. New pipework and repair of the old pipes will be completed by Casavant Fréres by the first of June.

The first of two new organ consoles is being created at Goulding & Wood here in Indianapolis. The first will be placed in the back balcony along with the new and renovated pipework. At the end of the project this console will not only control the balcony organ, but will also be connected so the front organ can be played from the back of the Sanctuary!
